TRANSATLANTIC ADVICES.

IRISH NIGHT IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Balfour Charged with Lying - Dark Threats of Bloodshed - An Indian Railway Subsidy - The Cholera's Approach - The Telegraph Congress' Perplexity.

LONDON, June 16.-In the House of Commons to-night Mr. Balfour, replying to Mr. Dillon, denied that the police charged upon and clubbed the people of New Tipperary for lighting bonfires to celebrate the marriage of William O'Brien.

Messrs. Gill and Clancy, Nationalists, questioned Mr. Balfour regarding the Government's system of "shadowing" persons in Ireland. They wanted to know how shadowing could prevent boycotting.

Mr. Balfour replied that no one was shadowed unless he was known to be engaged in intimidation. The Government would promise to reduce the system only on the condition that the Parliamentarians promised to induce the persons shadowed to abstain from intimidation.

Mr. Dillon: "If after this brutal, abominable outrage there is bloodshed it will be upon your heads."

Mr. Parnell asked Mr. Balfour to adopt the English presumption that every person accused is innocent until proven to be guilty.

Mr. Balfour: "Will Mr. Parnell undertake that these people shall not repeat their crime?"

This question brought out loud Parnellite cries of "What crime?" and a tremendous uproar on the Parnellite side of the House.

Mr. Dillon began an excited speech. He denounced Mr. Balfour and demanded an apology for the use of the word "crime."

A stormy scene ensued, in which Mr. Gill accused Mr. Balfour of lying, and Mr. Gladstone challenged him to prove his assertion that the Liberals resorted to the practice of shadowing.

Mr. Balfour substituted the words "intimidation and boycotting" for "crime."

Finally the Speaker appealed to the House and the matter was dropped.

All Well Lost for Love.

VIENNA, June 15.-The Archduchess Valerie to-day publicly renounced all claims to the throne of Austria in order that she might marry the man of her choice.

The German Army Bill.

BERLIN, June 15.-In the Reichstag Committee on the Army Bill to-day Herr Rickert's motion to determine the peace effective annually was rejected, 19 to 9.

Is It Cholera?

MADRID, June 16.-The Governor of Valencia is suffering from choleraic diarrhoea.

The Government announced in the senate to-day that it had not been proved that the disease now prevailing at Puebla de Rugat is Asiatic cholera and there was no cause for alarm.

LONDON, June 16.-Only eight persons besides the contracting parties and the officiating clergyman and his attendants will be present at the marriage of Mary Anderson to Mr. Navarro in the suburban church to-morrow.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Proposed Mission to the Jews - Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.

OTTAWA, June 16.-The General Assembly began the work of the second week this morning at 9 1/2 o'clock.

The first matter that was brought before the court at this morning's session was an appeal case from Perth bearing upon the question of a location for a new church.

A long discussion was held over a proposal to establish a mission to the Jews in Palestine. A sum of \$800 is now in the hands of the church for such a mission.

That the General Assembly express gratification at the success which has attended the inquiries prosecuted by the Foreign Missions Committee, and its special thanks to Mr. Mortimer Clark; instructs the Foreign Missions Committee to appoint a sub-committee to present inquiry further and especially to ascertain whether it would be desirable to co-operate with the Free Church Mission in Tiberias for a time and whether there are promising candidates for such a mission, and to report to the next General Assembly.

An amendment to the amendment to send the whole matter down to the Presbyteries to report upon was voted down by a large majority, and ultimately Principal Grant's amendment was carried over the original motion of Mr. Mortimer Clark by a majority of 14 to 9 and became the judgment of the court.

On an invitation from Kingston the General Assembly decided to meet next year in the Limestone City and within St. Andrew's Church there on the second Wednesday of June.

The Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund is divided into the Eastern and Western sections. In the maritime section the receipts are \$3904.

At the evening session the Bank-street Church was filled from platform to door.

After routine preliminaries the matter of French evangelization was brought before the house in an elaborate report, covering the year's work, presented by Principal MacVicar of Montreal.

The fund, \$51,341, against \$44,913 the previous year, are higher than those of any year in the history of the work.

One of the features of the year's record is the purchase of Coligny College, a ladies' college where young women may receive a competent training in French, English, music, &c., at moderate rates, at a cost of \$30,000.

The Pointe aux Trembles school, the girls' school, the orphanage de Parham, etc., are doing efficient service.

A new workman in the person of Rev. J. Taylor was appointed secretary at a salary of \$1000, charged with the direction of the work generally and instructed to present the claims of the board to the church.

Rev. Dr. Burns spoke upon the report in cordial advocacy of the work generally.

The temperance question came up next. Rev. Dr. Stiles Fraser, Convener of the Temperance Committee, presented to the Assembly the results of the responses that had come to enquiries sent down to congregations and presbyteries.

On the subject of "Temperance" there is as a rule some clever specializing. In the Supreme Court of the Presbyterian Church there are a number of intemperate temperance men and another portion that might be called "broad" on this question.

The committee brought in a number of recommendations, some of which were called in question. As the hour of adjournment was drawing near the members were just beginning to warm up to the issue. Their ardor was restrained for the time being.

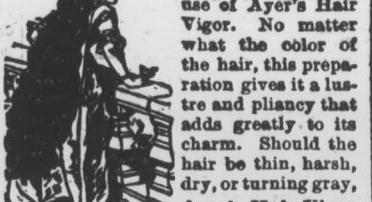
