The first matter that was brought before

the court at this morning's session was an appeal case from Perth bearing upon the nuation of a location for a new church. The Assembly, after considering all matters relating to the appeal, decided it would be inadvisable just at present to grant permission to the petitioning congregation to re-nove to a new site for the location of the proposed new church.

A long discussion was held over a proposal to establish a mission to the Jews in Palestine. A sum of \$8000 is now in the tands of the church for such a mission. It was moved by Mr. Mortimer Churk of Toronto, seconded by Principal Mac-




