The Express contends that Ismay did nothing disgraceful, yet is attacked as though he played the part of a shameful coward. The Daily News says: We have no intention of prejudicing the case or imitating the hasty and often savage verdicts pronounced in the States. All papers express satisfaction that preside at the enquiry, thereby en suring a thorough investigation. ### Companies Lose Heavily.

NEW YORK, April 23. Insurance men say that local losses paid by various Life. Accident and Marine Companies as a result of the Titanic disaster will approximate \$15,000,000. Two-thirds of this will fall on Marine Insurance Companies. The Insurance Field, a Trade journal published here, asserts that nowhere in the annals of insurance is there a parallel to the insurance losses occasioned by the sinking of the Titan ic. It makes the following estimate of total loss: Life Insurance, \$2, 193,000; Accident, Insurance, \$2,213,-000; Marine Insurance, ship, \$\$5,000,-000; Marine Insurance, ship, \$5,000, 406,000.


