From Cobalt.

Mr. James Cleary who has been absent from St. John's for over 14 years, returned here by the Bruce express yesterday. He had been 12 years prospecting in British Columbia and for the past two years has been engaged at similar work near Cobalt and in the Porcupine District. He was through the great fire in that section in August last when John Wall, of Harbor Main, and hundreds of others lost their lives, but came through unscathed. He had done well and will now go down in the Algerine with the James Bay expedition.

M.G.B. Parade.

At 10 a.m. yesterday the members of the Methodist Guards assembled at the C. L. B. Armoury, their own armoury being destroyed by fire recently, and paraded to service at George St. Church. The muster was a very large one and the battalion was in charge of Major Hutchings. Owing to the fact that some of the instruments and all the music was destroyed, though the band paraded no band music was discoursed along the route, but the bugle corps made up for this by blowing spirited military calls along the line of march. At the church Rev. J. W. Bartlett held service and preached a very eloquent sermon on an appropriate theme, "The rebuilding of Solomon's Temple." The rostrum was decorated with the Union Jack and Brigade colors, and bore the motto "Welcome." The brigade made a fine showing and were greatly admired.

South Coast Bankers.

Pretty nearly all the south coast bankers have returned off their herring baitings with catches ranging from 400 to 1,300 qtls. About 60 qtls. was the average for the Burin and Grand Bank fleets on their last trip, using herring as bait. The largest catch was that of the Lucy House, which had 1,300 qtls., and has stocked to date 1,900 qtls. Bankers which arrived last week report cod and bait very scarce on the Banks and they had very poor fares.

Madman Breaks Into Palace

New York, June 11.—A cable to the New York Times from London says: There was a lamentable occurrence early yesterday morning, at Marlborough House, Queen Alexandra's residence. A man named William Woodley, 40 years old, an escaped lunatic from Norwich, eluded the special guard of police and soldiers, broke in to Marlborough House and roamed about many rooms. Finally he went to sleep in a bed, in a room on the first floor. Queen Alexandra was not in residence at Marlborough, but the Princess Victoria was, and when the intruder broke in, she was sleeping in her apartment.

Exactly how Woodley accomplished his amazing feat is unknown. There are a number of policemen in the roadway and at the entrance to the gates and court yard of Marlborough House, two sentries pace up and down, with fixed bayonets.

The lunatic managed to escape the notice of the police, and soldiers, and climbed a ten foot high wall. This performance is not yet explained, as he had no rope or ladder.

Still unobserved, he walked up to the house, smashed a window in the equestrian room, and entered through the broken pane. Then he had the run, practically, of the whole house. Fortunately his madness did not develop into violence at any time. He roamed about the ground floor of the house, very quietly, without disturbing anyone. Then he went upstairs and opened one of the bedroom doors, he entered the room. Seeing nobody there he undressed and got into bed. Not until 7.45 o'clock in the morning was he discovered by a housemaid. The police were immediately called, and Woodley seemed surprised that his presence occasioned so much commotion.

Taft Has 50 Votes to Spare.

CHICAGO, To-Day.
After the committee finished its work, Director McKinley gave out a table claiming a total of 590 delegates for Taft, 50 more than necessary for nomination and conceding only 442 to Roosevelt. The Roosevelt people declined to give out any figures. The McKinley table gave Taft 83 of New York's 90 delegates, but at the very moment he was giving it out, the New York delegation was incautious and former Governor Woodruff was declaring that 17 delegates from Brooklyn would follow him into the Roosevelt column. Conservative estimates had allowed Taft not more than 75 from New York. Later in the evening, after the New York meeting, the State chairman said the vote of the New York delegation indicates Taft, 76; Roosevelt, 9; anti-Roosevelt, 3; doubtful, 2. This is counting absentees.

It is not near as good to date as last year. Some boats from Petit Fort struck it lucky but most of those on the west side of Placentia Bay did poorly, and unless the fish again strike in a bad failure must be recorded. The lobster fishery from Paradise to Oderin is very good and there is a bigger pack to date than last year.
