## Diana Gone North.

The S.S. Diana which put into Halifax three weeks ago in a battered condition as a result of a trying experience in a north-east hurricane while en route from St. John's to Halifax, and which was dry docked at the latter port for complete repairs, has left for Hamilton Inlet, on the Labrador. She is chartered by four prospectors who went along in her. The party is comprised of Americans, who, it is said, are making but a flying visit to the northern regions.

## Mrs. Tucker Calls Upon Her Sisters

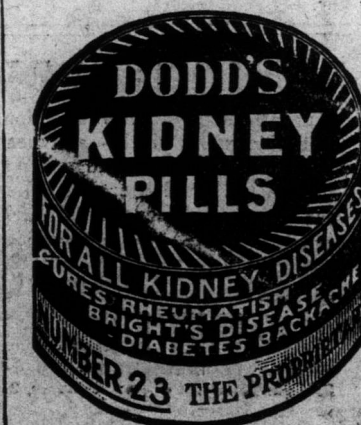
TO GIVE THE CLERKS A SQUARE SHOW.

## Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

VIENNA, Oct. 28. A bridge across the Tichot River has been blown up by the Bulgarians, thus interrupting communication between Burgas and Constantinople, according to a despatch from the correspondent of the Reicepost, who is at the headquarters of the Bulgarian Army. The correspondent adds that the Bulgarians are making steady progress against the Turkish field army. The strength of the Turkish troops around Adrianople is estimated at four army corps. A despatch to the same paper from Scutari says that a Montenegrin flying corps has cut Turkish communication between Scutari and St. Giovanni di Molui on the coast.

HALIFAX, Oct. 28. The Heald's annual ten mile race for the Maritime Championship, took place to-day, and was won by Michael Thomas, a Micmac, of the Abegweit Club of Charlottetown, for the third consecutive time; he, thus, becoming the owner of the championship trophy. W. Wall of Newfoundland, finished 24th. Time, Michael Thomas, 58 minutes 30 1/2 seconds; James McKay, Halifax Wanderers, 58 minutes 35 seconds; Alfred Rogers, Halifax, Oxford, 58 minutes 40 seconds.

OTTAWA, Oct. 28. It is understood that the Hon. Robert Rogers will be sworn in tomorrow, to replace Monk as Minister of Public Works; Dr. Roche to succeed Rogers as Minister of the Interior; and Hon. Louis Coderre to replace Dr. Roche as Secretary of State. Dr. Roche and Mr. Coderre will be sworn in as Privy Counsellors.

HALIFAX, Oct. 28. The Montreal English Rugby football team was defeated to-day by All Halifax, 14 to 3.

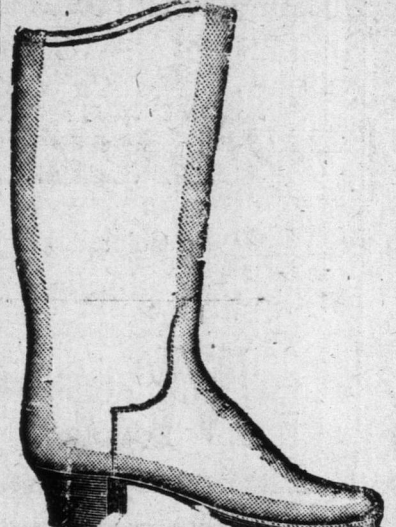

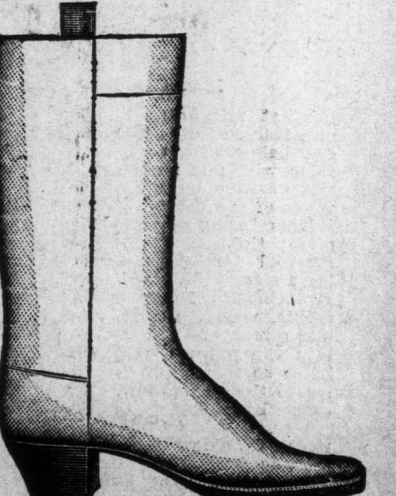
