Household Notes.

If you wish your bread to have a soft crust, wrap in a clean cloth as soon as it comes from the oven.

Sweet potatoes will keep for weeks if put into a strong paper bag and placed in the refrigerator.

Chop left-over meat and use in a highly seasoned, jellied meat loaf. Garnish with slices of hard-boiled egg.

To pop corn successfully, place corn in popper, drench with water and place over fire. Every grain will pop.

When using the fireless cooker, use metal radiators for quick baking and the soapstone for slower baking.

Cocoa often tastes raw because the cocoa, sugar and water have not been cooked together before adding the milk.

Skin grapes, remove the seeds and insert nut meats; serve on lettuce with French dressing containing grape juice.

Fill left-over pop-overs with a flavored, sweetened gelatine in which cream and milk are used instead of water. Chill.
