Minister of Education Breaks Silence.

Explains Reasons For Present Conditions--Another Barren Session of House.

Whilst the amount of business done at the House yesterday was negligible, the session was by no means an uninteresting one. Mr. Archibald, the independent member for Hr. Grace made a clear and concise statement of his position and must have caused feelings of shame to rise in the breasts of those members of the Government who had not the same independence of spirit. As Government champion Mr. Samson was scarcely a success whilst Dr. Barnes, who made his first speech for the session would have been wiser to remain silent rather than that he should have ventured on an explanation of present conditions of so ridiculous nature.

The House met at 3.15 p.m. Mr. Archibald rose on a point of privilege to refer to an article about him in the "Advocate." This article charged him with playing up to what it called the "Tory Opposition." Mr. Archibald declared that he had taken an independent stand until some policy was formed to help the work of the country. He would attach himself to the party which evolved such a policy. He referred to the many successful meetings he had held in his constituency. There was only one man in his district who disagreed with the stand he had taken. He read a resolution passed unanimously at a meeting of his constituents which commended his action. This resolution had 351 signatures of Hr. Grace electors attached to it. When so many names could be found attached to such a resolution when the Government was in power only two years, the feeling of the district could be gauged. During the General Election he had told the electors of his district that if he thought his party was not acting in the people's interests he would put his seat in their hands. Now, he had done this. If Hr. Grace were standing by him it was not standing by his two colleagues. The condition of Newfoundland to-day was such that it would require the best brains, both within and outside the House to help the country pull through. This was no time for party politics. Mr. Archibald concluded by saying that anyone who attacked him personally was attacking the district of Hr. Grace. As regards the Prime Minister's statement that he could do without Archibald, then he had also to do without Hr. Grace district.

F.P.U. Mr. Samson asked Sir Michael to prove that he had taken any oath. He denied it absolutely.

Sir Michael: "Then you're not an F.P.U. man."

Continuing, Sir Michael said that Mr. Samson was one of the backers of a Government which had ruined the country. The Government was hopeless. They had a railway and did not know what to do with it and they had spent the \$4,000,000 surplus. Sir Michael regretted that there were not more men like Mr. Archibald on the other side of the House.

Mr. Bennett expressed his admiration of Mr. Archibald's stand. He had no hesitation in saying that the people who elected the present Government were disgusted with their actions. Legislation was now a farce. No member had been sent to the House to listen to the dictates of any man. Could any member oppose say that the Government had been a faith with the people. Every pledge of the Government had been broken. Mr. Bennett claimed that the electors up North had been betrayed when they put in the present representatives.

Mr. Higgins: "Once a man ceases to become a subject he must be noticed again. I state that as a medical fact." (Laughter.)

Mr. Bennett mentioned the railway and condemned the idea of bringing down a Vice-President of the C.P.R. to run a railway like ours. He said it was analogous to setting a schoolmaster in command of a battleship.

Sir John Crosbie, upon rising, was at first ruled out of order by the Speaker, and even Sir John's persuasive manner could not influence the "First Commoner," so that he was forced to use the last resort, and moved the adjournment of the House. Speaking to the motion, Sir John extended his congratulations to Mr. Archibald upon the manner in which he had been acquitted by his constituents. Early in his speech he got up against Mr. Samson, who seemed to be looking for trouble, and he certainly succeeded in finding it. Sir John also had a hot argument with Mr. Halfyard over various matters including the inefficiency of the Postal Department. Sir John said that Mr. Halfyard was going down in the Department of Marine and Fisheries. Soon afterwards Mr. Halfyard said the Post Office officials were expressing regret at his approaching departure, a statement which lent color to Sir John's assertion.

Dr. Barnes ascended the House by actually making a speech. He said he had no fault to find with Mr. Archibald for severing his connection with the Government side of the House. The only fault he had to find with Mr. Archibald was that he was not given a chance to participate in that gentleman's recent message. He knew the conditions that existed in Harbor Grace and was doing his level best to meet them. He said that he had faith enough yet in the Government to think that they could find a way out to meet the problems confronting them. Referring to the 351 names on the resolution presented to Mr. Archibald, he saw the names of many men who had supported him in the general election.

Mr. Archibald: "Be honest, Doctor! Look at that list again and you will find that 80 per cent of the signatures were friends of ours in the general election."

Dr. Barnes: "Yes, but we are only sharing in the trouble following the war. If we were known to me that the Government had not been acting properly, I would follow Mr. Archibald, but I want to be convinced that the Government is not doing its part. So far as I can see it is doing its utmost to right matters."

Mr. Higgins expressed his double surprise, first because Dr. Barnes had at last broken his long silence, and secondly at the poor quality of the arguments put up by him in the role of Government apologist. Mr. Higgins condemned the Minister of Education for making such paltry excuses for the Government's actions. He showed that the colony had lost millions through the incompetency of the Government. With reference to the bringing out of Sir George Bury, Mr. Higgins said that gentleman would get a fine fat fee and when he went away he wouldn't be able to spell the names of the stations along the railway. After a year of bungling on railway matters, it was a crowning act to get down an administrative man from Canada to grasp the situation in 72 hours. He would probably have a fine summer salmon fishing. The report of Sir George Bury would be of as much value for working out railway problems as the Auditor's report was in jailing Cadogan and Crosbie.

Mr. Archibald rose to reply to Dr. Barnes. He saw no reason why Dr. Barnes should feel slighted at not being asked to be present at his meetings. He had called them merely to explain his position and to offer his seat to his district. He could not see how Dr. Barnes had been slighted. If Dr. Barnes and Mr. Gosse resigned would he would resign his now and go back and contest the district with them. Out of the names on the resolution, 80 per cent were supporters of his in 1919. solid in 1919 for Gosse, Barnes and Archibald, 210 signed the resolution as an endorsement of the stand he had taken. He did not wish to be misrepresented. When Mr. Archibald had concluded his speech, the House divided on Sir John Crosbie's motion for adjournment, which was lost by 14-13 on a strictly party vote. After notice of questions had been given the Municipal Indemnity Bill was read a third time. The remaining Orders of the Day were deferred, and adjournment was taken at 6.30 p.m. until 3 p.m. to-day.

Mr. MacDonnell Still An "Anti."

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir:—I am pained beyond measure to read in this morning's News that Mr. J. A. MacDonnell is still an anti-suffragist, and that he still "vehemently opposes" the suffrage bill. I really thought that I had converted him. This time Mr. MacDonnell states as one of his reasons why women should not have suffrage that "woman's place is in her home." I don't know if he gave any other reasons, nor if they were all like this one. The News notes this reason, no doubt. I go further than Mr. MacDonnell and state that man's place is in the office, or the shop, or the factory, or the farm, or the fishing boat, or the mine, or the wharf. Let Mr. MacDonnell contradict that if he dare. I also state dogmatically that a dog's place is in his kennel, that a cat's place is in the water, that a worm's place is in the earth, that a bat's place is on the head, that an air plane's place is in the air. Does Mr. MacDonnell deny this? I state also that cork floats, iron sinks, marble busts, window panes and Niagara Falls. Also wine vaults, sulphur springs, jam rolls, grass slopes, music stands, moonlight walks, sheep run, Kent hops, holiday trips, standard weights, India rubber, direct reductions, time flies, and if Mr. MacDonnell keeps up his opposition to the bill you can't tell what may happen! All this has nothing to do with political suffrage. That principle is not affected by any of the facts adduced here, any more than by Mr. MacDonnell's fact that "woman's place is in her home," which fact by the way every sensible person knows. Of course woman's place is in her home—if she has one to be in. Voting in this country occurs once every four years, and takes about three minutes to accomplish. Roughly, an hour every four years will be totally wasted by women having the vote. I can sympathize with Mr. MacDonnell's apologetic attitude. Terrible possibilities are wrapped up in close now with the suggestion that the place for the girl stenographers and office workers of Mr. MacDonnell's office is in the home—will he live up to his principle?

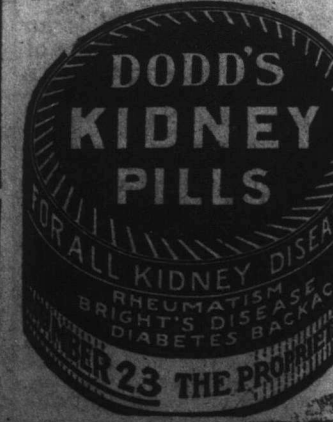
