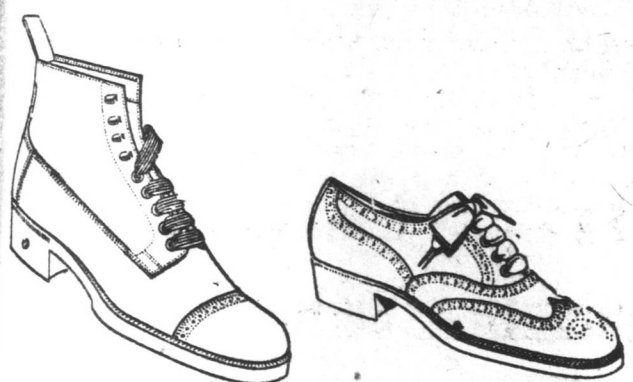

Our Dumb Animals

Report of Chief Agent For Week Ending Sept. 12th.

Called late on Sunday night to Jensen Camp, to humbly put to death a dog owned by Mr. King, which had been run over by a motor car. The motor owner paid for the value of the dog. Shortly after I received another message to go to Water St. West, to put to death another dog which had been run over in the same way. This inhumane driver I am now trying to locate. I would like here to refer to Section 20 of Chapter II. of the Act for Protection of Animals, which states, "That whenever an animal is injured by an automobile or motor cycle, it shall be the duty of the person who is driving such automobile or riding such motor cycle, at the time of such injury, if the animal is injured beyond cure, forthwith to kill or cause to be killed, such animal and report such killing or injury to the nearest Justice of the Peace, Station Agent, or police office, who shall thereupon give public notice of the fact in such manner as may be most expedient."

The horse complained of in the field near King's Bridge, has gone to the Fox Farm. There has been another complaint of below Ross's Farm. I will be getting the advice of the Veterinary Surgeon, concerning same. Attended the landing of 150 head of cattle, 60 sheep, and two horses, from the Canadian Sapper. I would like just here to thank Mr. M. Kennedy and the men under him, for the great care taken of these cattle. They were all watered and sufficiently fed up to the time they were taken away. Attended three sales at the Abattoir Co., where the cattle were all removed as soon as possible, with the exception of a couple of calves, that remained over through some slight mistake on the part of the owner. I received a phone message concerning them late at night. I have interviewed the owner, who explained the case satisfactorily. I was waited on during the week by some ladies, who stated that they had placed their orders with their grocers early in the week but had not received their goods until late on Saturday night. They contend that it is not always the fault of the housewives that horses are kept out late on Saturday nights delivering parcels, but very often the fault lies with those who have to fill their orders. I would also like to thank the great number of people who have taken an interest in the Society. All calls, as far as I know, have been promptly attended to during the week. Three cats were humanely destroyed for Mrs. T. J. Dwyer, Mrs. Malone and Rev. P. G. Butler.
