The Re-distribution Bill

The Re-distribution Bill which was introduced by the Prime Minister during yesterday's session of the House is in a word a measure which is intended to give to the people of the Colony their full rights and privileges as voters for the first time in its history. Many Governments promised to deal with this very important question, but the difficulties which faced them appeared so insurmountable that it was invariably quietly dropped from their programme, and in the meantime, so far as fair representation was concerned, matters were allowed to go from bad to worse.

In tackling this delicate problem the Government have shown courage. In the practical solution which they have submitted to the Legislature, they have, we believe, succeeded in finding a way out without making any alteration in the scale of representation of the various denominational bodies. They have so divided the districts as to make the individual vote of practically equal value throughout the Island, and by basing the whole plan upon the idea of one man to a district, they will have vested each member of the Government with an equal amount of responsibility in the Assembly. It will further have the effect of making a thorough canvass far less strenuous, and far more effective, and it will enable members to keep in closer touch with their constituents.

Prior to any intimation of such a measure being under consideration, we had dealt with this subject along lines not dissimilar to those outlined in the bill, and the measure before us appears to be a thoroughly workable plan, and seems to meet the requirements most admirably. It has been brought down early in the session, and the members will therefore have time to become thoroughly familiar with it, and to bring to bear their wide knowledge of the country's requirements into the discussion of the proposals. It is earnestly to be hoped, and we believe it is safe to say, that the bill will be considered purely on its merits, and even if it does not meet with the personal views of a member, that he will sink his own feelings in the matter in order to give to the country a blessing for which it has long been praying.

Portia Icebound

The prevailing south and south west winds of the past week have driven in the Gulf ice on the South West coast, and as a result shipping on that part of the coast is at present at a standstill. The Portia bound to Port aux Basques with cargo and passengers has been detained at Rose Blanche since Monday, and there is no possibility of her getting clear until a change of wind takes place. Many of the passengers are en route to Canada, and it is likely that the Kyle will have to call there to take them on board on her next trip across.

Petition

IN CONNECTION WITH THE WINDING UP OF BUILDING ASSOCIATION.

To the Honourable the Supreme Court
 The Petition of William J. Higgins, his Majesty's Attorney General, humbly sheweth as follows:—

1. The Dominion Co-operative Building Association, Ltd., was on the 8th day of Jan., 1920 incorporated under the laws of Newfoundland with a capital of \$2,000,000.00 divided into 20,000 shares of \$100.00 each.

2. The objects of the Company are to purchase, take on lease and acquire any lands and buildings in St. John's, and any estate or interest in any rights connected with any such lands and buildings.

3. No notice of the Head Office of the Company has been filed with the Registrar of Companies.

4. At a meeting of the directors of the Company held on the 9th day of Sept., 1920, the Hon. J. D. Ryan was elected President, and the Hon. John Anderson managing director and secretary of the Company.

5. By Minute of the Executive Council dated the 16th day of July, 1920, it was ordered that the Govt. give to the Royal Bank of Canada a guarantee for the repayment to the said Bank of the sum of \$25,000.00 advanced by the said Bank to the Company.

6. By Minute of the Executive Council, dated the 17th day of Sept., 1920, it was ordered that the Government give to the Royal Bank of Commerce a guarantee for the repayment to the said Bank of the further sum of \$25,000.00 advanced by the said Bank to the Company.

7. The Company did not repay to the said Royal Bank of Canada the said advances of \$50,000.00 made by the said Bank to the Company, and under the said guarantee the Government is liable to the said Bank in the said sum of \$50,000.00 together with interest thereon amounting to \$8762.09 making a total of \$58,762.09.

8. In each of the Minutes of the Executive Council hereinbefore referred to it was directed that the guarantee by the Government to the Royal Bank of Canada was to be made "subject to the condition that the Auditor General of the Colony shall have the right to examine the books of the said Association in respect of the expenditure of \$25,000.00."

9. The Auditor General has made frequent applications to the managing director of the Company for a statement of the accounts of the Company and other necessary information, and he has reported to me that the accounts of the company are in such a chaotic condition that it is impossible to deal intelligently with them, that no cash account has been kept and that there is apparently no record kept of the disposition of the moneys received or for what or by whom they were paid, and that he has been unable to obtain a statement of the assets of the Company.

10. I am informed and verily believe that the shareholders of the Company with one or two exceptions have been repaid by the Company the amounts paid by them to the Company in respect of shares in the Company subscribed by the said shareholders.

11. By the Act 11 Geo. V. Cap. 5, entitled "An Act respecting the Dominion Co-operative Building Association, Ltd.," the Minister of Finance and Customs was authorized to pay to the Company during the term of twenty years from the first day of January, 1920, any sum by which the net earnings of the Company should be less than five per centum on the paid up capital of the Company.

12. The Company is insolvent and unable to pay to the Government the amount of its said indebtedness.

13. There are assets of the Company which have not yet been realized and there are amounts due to the Company by certain parties who have purchased from the Company houses to be paid for under agreement on the instalment plan.

14. It is necessary and expedient that the Company be wound up.

Your Petitioner therefore humbly prays (1) that this Honourable Court may order that the Company be wound up by the Court; (2) that such other order may be made in the premises as to the Court may seem meet.

And your Petitioner as in duty bound will ever pray, etc.

The Missionary Centenary of the Methodist Church

On the 25th August, 1824, the first Canadian Methodist Conference was organized and three days later the Missionary Society of the Conference was brought into being. At that time the Church comprised about twelve thousand people; now the number is one hundred and fifty thousand; the income in the first year of the Society was \$144.00; now the income is \$1,200,000.00. The history of the one hundred years to 1924 is one of heroic endeavour. Our early Missionaries suffered privation and hardship but with steadfast purpose, like the Missionaries of other Churches, laboured for the uplift of the widely scattered people. Romance and poetry and faith and high resolve are to be found in the story of the one hundred years. The Methodist Church, upon the 25th of August, celebrates the victories won for the Kingdom of Christ. The motto of the Centenary Celebration is "To the Glory of God." It is realized that God alone could have done this wondrous work and the human agencies were the humble, willing instruments of His purpose. This celebration is not for the glorification of the Methodist Church, nor for the praise of the noble men and women who gave their lives so freely to this work; but for the praise and glory of Him who is the Head of the Church, through Whom alone this work could have been done.

In St. John's during the months of January and February the Pastors of the Methodist Churches have been preaching, at intervals, sermons dealing with the work of the past 100 years of Missionary endeavour.

On Sunday next, 8th March, Missionary Anniversaries will be held in Cochrane and Wesley Churches. On the Sunday following, similar services in Gower and George Street Churches. Methodism is a connexion and a brotherhood and these phases will be emphasised by the special attendance of these congregations at the Anniversaries. Thus these Services will bring together the members of different congregations.

On Wednesday evening, March 18th, in Gower Street Church, there will be held a mass meeting made up of the congregations of the four city Methodist Churches. A united choir will lead the singing and the meeting will be one of thanksgiving and inspiration. On the following Sunday, March 22nd, each church will make a special offering for the Centenary Certificates. These will be used in connection with the registration of every Methodist whose name will be inscribed on the Roll which will be deposited in the Archives in Toronto. The fee for this registration is \$1.00 for each person. This will be the last Methodist registration in British North America, and every Methodist man, woman and child should be registered.

The respective congregations will, during the last weeks of Lent, be led during the last weeks of Lent, be led to meditate upon the sufferings and agony which Our Lord endured in His work for the salvation of the world. Then will come the glorious festival of Easter and the triumph over death leading all to look forward to the time when the Kingdoms of this world shall be the Kingdoms of Our Lord and Christ and He shall reign for ever and ever.

PLAYGROUND AND RECREATION ASSOCIATION.

A meeting of the Executive of the Playground and Recreation Association was held yesterday and was well attended. It has been decided to again invite Mr. R. S. Barton, who so successfully conducted the playground at Bannerman and Victoria Parks last summer, to visit St. John's during June, July and August this year. Mr. Barton will be assisted in conducting and supervising the playgrounds this summer by three male and four lady instructors whose services will be obtained locally. It is intended to commence a third playground for children residing in the central portion of the city, at Buckmaster's Field. In conjunction with the Municipal Council is it hoped to make a concrete paddling pool for children, in Bannerman Park, which could be utilized as an ice skating rink during the winter months. About one thousand dollars worth of equipment will be purchased to be divided between the three playgrounds. The activities of the Associations were confined during the past winter to providing free afternoons for children at the Prince's Park, and these afternoons were greatly helped by Mount Cashel and Bennett's Bands, which volunteered their services on different afternoons. Now that spring is approaching everything will be got in readiness for the summer activities and a general meeting of the Association will be called at an early date to discuss the summer's programme.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

HON. WM. PUGSELEY PASSES AWAY.—TORONTO, Ont., March 4. Hon. William Pugsley, native of Sussex, N.B., died here to-night from pneumonia. Mr. Pugsley occupied many prominent positions including that of Minister of Public Works in the Laurier Government and later Lieut. Governor of New Brunswick. His latest activity was as chairman of the committee adjudicating claims of Canadians for reparations against the Germans. He was stricken here with pneumonia over a week ago.

CANADIAN SUBSIDY PLAN DISCUSSED.—OTTAWA, March 4.

Some sharp interchanges marked the opening of the debate in the House to-day on the Government's plan to subsidize the Petersen line Steamers in an effort to break the North Atlantic shipping rates. In anticipation of debate the public galleries were crowded.

TREMORS STILL OCCURRING.—QUEBEC, March 4.

Earth tremors occurred to-day at Murray Bay but no damage is reported to houses although the population is badly frightened. Tremors occurred at between one and two hours intervals.

SIMPLICITY TO MARK INAUGURAL CEREMONY.—WASHINGTON, March 4.

President Coolidge will renew his covenant of service to-morrow with an inaugural service by his own direction. There will be no extravagant display of rejoicing and no glittering pageant, but when he pledges his faith as chief executive for another four years, he will have about him many quite manifestations of dignity and solemnity of the task that lies before him.

FOCH MAY SUGGEST A PLAN OF ENFORCEMENT.—PARIS, March 4.

The Ambassadors' council to-day after being briefly adjourned, resumed the Allied War Committee's summary of the report of the military control mission to Germany requested Marshal Foch and his colleagues to make suggestions as to how in their judgement the Germans may be forced to comply with the disarmament clauses of the Treaty of Versailles.
