

The following is contract for the county printing, but being anxious to secure that renumerative work, he got over the difficulty by having the tender laid before the Council in the name of an employee in the office. Whether he had the effrontery to suppose that the Council would be deceived by such a dodge, or whether he calculated that the august body would wink at his little game, and recognize the tender of his employee as a bona fide one, we are not prepared to say, but it strikes us that both parties to the contract have evaded the law in a manner not very creditable. The Council were not deceived, and they knew perfectly well that they were awarding the contract to a man who, from his position, was debarred by law from tendering. And yet in the face of this they gave Mr. Chadwick the contract. Not that we envy that gentlemen the possession—of his "prize." On not our tender was more than twice as high as that of the Hersdd, and then it was put at so low a rate that there would be but a merely nominal profit on the work. There may be glory and prestige, and all that sort of thing in deing the county printing, but the glory, etc., is somewhat dimmed when the work is taken at a price that will not pay for the bare cost of the white paper on which it is done.
