That Are Signed Against Macadamizing Dufferin Avenue.

Sewers and Switches, Sidewalks and Lane Fences, Discussed at Number Two Committee.

The meeting of the board of works began on the sidewalk in front of the City Hotel last night, when Ald. Thos. Jones, Ald. Shaw, Assistant City Engineer Ironsides, Secretary Bell and Commissioner Owen waited for a quorum. After a while Ald. Garratt happened along and the committee adjourned to the hall to pass a few accounts. Ald. Coo dropped in a little later and completed a quorum.

Thomas Walls' request for privilege to run a switch from the C. P. R. to his premises found favor and will so be reported to the council.

Mr. V. Cronyn complained of the state of the Dundas street sewer at his place. It had flooded the cellar and the effluvia had nearly driven the family out the house. The engineer reported that the facts were

as stated and that the sewer had been constructed in a disgraceful manner. However another manhole had been build which would probably prevent its becoming blocked again.

The engineer also reported that several signatures against the macadamizing of Dufferin avenue were in his opinion not valid. Names were signed on behalf of other persons, and the power of attorney was not produced.

Ald. Garratt moved that the matter be laid over until next week, as he had learned on good authority that Bishop O'Connor was going to withdraw his objection. The matter was laid over, The paving of Dundas street down town

caused soms discussion. Assistant Engineer Ironsides stated that two blocks of cedar pavement would cost nearly \$4,000. Roughly speaking, asphalt would cost \$3 yard, and vitrified brick, with concrete oundation, \$2 a yard. Ald. Coo moved that the city pay the

balance due on the present block-paving providing the ratepayers petitioned for a permanent pavement, and that the engineer prepare an estimate of the cost of pavements made of vitrified brick, asphalt or

Ald. Garatt moved that a 5 foot 4 inch sidewalk be placed on the east side of Colborne street between Dufferin avenue and Princess avenue. As Ald. Coo had left the room and there was not a quorum the

matter was laid over. With reference to Francis Faulkner's grievance about a lane fence adjoining his property on Campbell street being taken down every fair time, causing him much trouble and expense, the engineer reported that there was no lane existing on the east side of his property. The lane only ran between King and York streets and did not extend to Campbell. "If the fence is pulled down at fair time as he states, he has cause for a civil action against the parties doing it for trespass. But it is not done by any city officials, so that it is a matter that does not come under their jur-
