BUFFALO, Dec. 27.—The police arrested today another pugilist named Michael Leary, charged with having no visible means of support. Justice Harrington allowed Leary a week in which to find employment or leave the city.

"Sally" Smith and Johnny Van Heest have been driven out of town, and the police are after other pugilists who have no visible means of support. Superintendent Bull says he will clear the city of this class of persons before the week is out.

McAFFERY'S DECADENCE.

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Dominic McCaffery, the heavy-weight and former instructor of the Manhattan Athletic Club, was fined \$3 in the Tombs police court this morning by Justice Ryan. McCaffery was found in City Hall Park last night asleep and covered with snow. He had no money and was locked up.

LAVIGNE AND THE GANG GET OFF.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 27.—"Kid" Lavigne and party were discharged today by Judge Ashton, on the finding of the coroner's jury that Bowen, the prize fighter, met his death by concussion of the brain, produced by striking the unpadded floor of the ring.

MOCKEY.

ARRIVAL OF THE BOSTONIAN BOYS.

MONTREAL, Dec. 27.—The American College hockey players got a fine taste of Canadian weather when they reached Montreal from Boston today. Commutation in the New York Post-office.

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Forty employees of the postoffice were discharged today as being useless, 250 were reduced in salary, and 600 had their pay increased. These changes follow the report made by a commission sent from Washington to examine the New York office. The men discharged had been in the service for many years.

Wheat in Ontario and Manitoba.

Crop bulletin No. 45 of the Manitoba Agricultural Department has just arrived. According to it there were in 1894 1,010,186 acres in wheat, which produced 17,172,883 bushels, an average of seventeen bushels per acre. It will be interesting to compare with this the production of Ontario. The November bulletin of the Ontario Department of Agriculture gave the area in wheat as 1,009,008 acres; the production 10,879,960 bushels, making an average of 10.7 bushels. It will thus be seen that during 1894 the wheat area of the two Provinces was almost exactly identical, but that Ontario produced about 2,700,000 bushels more than Manitoba, owing to a greater average of 2.7 bushels. Ontario, therefore, still holds her place as the greatest wheat-producing Province of the Dominion. Over 80 per cent of the last year's crop in Ontario was fall wheat. The average wheat production of Ontario exceeds that of any other Province or of any State in the Union.

Lots of Fun

At a Municipal Meeting in London West.

Deputy Reeve Scarrow Speaks of the Triumvirate and the "Great I Am."

Councillor Moore Vigorously Defends the Council's Cause.

The \$100 Breakwater and Councillor Hammond—Fungus Speeches and a Lively Time.

The ratepayers' meeting in Collins' Hall, London West, last night was somewhat tame compared with meetings held in bygone years, but, after all, there was considerable fun. It was called for the purpose of discussing the annual report of the village's council for 1894. However, the report was not dealt with at any great length, the speakers indulging largely in sarcastic remarks and jokes at the expense of their opponents. The members of the council were called upon to give an account of their stewardship, and spirited speeches were in order. Squire R. F. Lacey presided and announced the object of the meeting.

The report, which was in printed form and distributed to those present, contained a statement of the village moneys according to the treasurer's books for 1891, 1892 and 1893. Up to May 15 this year when the late treasurer was dismissed, Mr. Nichols had received \$2,599.44, but had not handed it all over to his successor. He still held, it was claimed, \$326.26 of the corporation funds. An itemized account of the village moneys was given from May 15 when Mr. Nichols was appointed treasurer until Dec. 15, the end of the year. The receipts were \$22,052.79, and came from the usual sources of revenue. The expenditures were as follows: Board of works, \$477.41; salaries, \$359.08; printing, etc., \$162.50; school account, \$1,805.35; breakwater, \$216.75; electric light, \$887.25; interest account, \$1,270.35; repayment of loans, \$12,215.85; county rates, \$2,778.90; miscellaneous, \$181.39, leaving a cash deposit in the bank of \$1,728.22.

THE REEVE TALKS.

Reeve Macdonald was the first to speak, and he gave a lengthy review of his course to an attentive audience. He said it was pleasing for an official to have a good report to present, especially if the year was an easy one. That, however, was not the case this year. The council of last year was like a ship at sea without a rudder. They had no statement to make at the nomination meeting. Their accounts were in such a condition that you could not tell from them what they had done or what they had not done. They had spent village money in an unknown way and without consulting the ratepayers.

The law read that the council was to publish the auditors' statement, but instead of this they accepted a supposed statement, and at the same time instructed the clerk not to make it public. This led the speaker to suspect something wrong, and his suspicion was strengthened when he saw at last election day persons whom he supposed were his friends canvassing for Mr. Spence. Mr. Macdonald reviewed his proceedings against Mr. Spence. "And when I got the seat Mr. Bartram was the only person to attend the first meeting of the council. We were exactly like Robinson Crusoe and his dog on the island of Juan Fernandez—no one came near us. But I was bound to keep the office if no one came to the meetings; but like Jones' cows the members wheeled in one at a time." The ex-treasurer's affairs were also spoken of. The council wanted Mr. Nichols to hand over his books for an examination, but he wouldn't do it. They were secured by civil process, and it was found that Mr. Nichols was a defaulter to the extent of \$700 or \$1,000, and that he had some \$350 of village money dangling in his pocket. The village got the cash, but now it was found by further investigation that Mr. Nichols owed the village about \$326.26 more. According to one of the books examined the corporation had not received a dollar in four months. That was very funny, yet it was also seen that money was being dribbled into the bank. Yet the auditors' statement showed the village had a balance of over \$200. "Now," said the reeve, "is there a man, a boy or a child who could be induced to believe that in four months the village had not received a cent? It is a case to me that the auditors had gone mad—crazy. They were dismissed, but that poor, unfortunate man—Lord—dismissed himself. It remains with the citizens to say what is to be done with him. 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
