# ACCUSED BLAME THE DEAD GIRL

Opening of Defense in Patterson Murder Trial.

Plea of Counsel for the Accused-Testimony of the Alleged Murderers.

Paterson, N. J., Jan. 17.-Yesterday afternoon, in the Bosschieter murder trial, Michael Dunn opened the case for the defense.

Counsel promised to prove that the death of Jennie Bosschieter was not caused in the commission of a criminal assault, and also that the charge of willful murder could not stand against the defendants.

Dunn proceeded with a marrative of the events preceding the death of Jen-Bosschieter, the purpose of it being to show that the meeting of the four men, McAlister, Campbell, Death and Kerr, was not prearranged, and that the girl made the first advances that opened the way for the meeting at Saal's saloon.

In the saloon, according to counsel, the girl drank freely, taking cock-tails and absinthe until she became drowsy. Then she was excorted from the saloon to the hack, McAlister and Death walking on either side of her. She was not carried, the at-orney said. The narrative of counsel for the defense proceeded with the ride in the hack to the place where the girl died. She had become unconscious, and the men lifted her from the hack to the ground, where they kneeled around her and made every effort to revive her, rubbing her hands and face. She was taken with nausea and the men used their pocket handkerchiefs to wipe her face.

Counsel said that the hackman was mistaken when he testified that the accused men assaulted the girl. spairing of succeeding in restoring her to consciousness, the men put her back in the hack and drove for aid to the house of the nearest physician. The death of Jennie Bosschieter,

Dunn said, was accidental; her drink was not drugged by the defendants, or either of them, and she was not criminally assaulted.

MCALISTER'S STORY. Walter C. McAlister, one of the acused, was then called to the stand. He said he saw Jennie Bosschieter with Death and Campbell on the evening of Oct. 18. He had known Jennie Bosschieter about two and a half years. He had taken her riding when he first became acquainted with her, but had never gone to any social affairs with her. He did not speak to her on the evening of the 18th, when the first saw her, because he did not think she had seen him.

The witness and Kerr walked to Saal's saloon, which they entered. Death came out of the back room and drinks. McAlister Death whether he might foin the party in the back room and Death replied that he would ask the girl, Jennie Bosschieter. Afterward he called Me-Alister to come in. Subsequently the witness ordered a bottle of cham-

The girl drank two glasses of wine and then appeared to be "pretty full." There was a hack outside of the saloon, and it was thought that a drive would do the girl good. Accordingly they took her out to the hack, the wit ness and Death walking by her side. Kerr and Campbell followed them out the hack and then walked across the street and started in the direction of Paterson street. The witness and Death got into the back with the etri and drove in the same direction that the others had taken. They overtook Kerr and Campbell and the witness invited them to enter the hack, which they did. They all then drove up the Goffle road, intending to stop at Leet's place, but when they reached there it was closed. Then they turned around to drive home and had entered Rock road when the girl asked to be taken out of the carriage as she was sick at the stomach. They accordingly took the blanket and placing it on the ground, laid the girl on it. They tried in every way to revive her but with-out avail, and they finally took her back to the hack and drove to the brook in the vicinity, where they took her out of the hack again and bathed her face and temples with water. They put her back into the hack and

Toronto, Jan. 17.-The session of the Ontario Legislature is now only three weeks off, and in political circles the programme of government bulls is being actively discussed. Premier Ross and the members of the government maintain a discreet silence regarding their plans, but a few of the matters

to be brought up have come to the In view of the marked success of the experiments in raising sugar beets in Ontario last year at three experimental points, the government have been compelled to turn their attention to the subject, and a bill to provide for the encouragement of the industry is regarded as almost a certainty. It is rumored that the encouragement may be directed more to the farmer than to the manufacturer, thus varying the practice in several states of the union. The opening of many new sections of Northern Ontario has rendered the construction of further railways necessary, and it is probable that grants will be recommended for lines running northward from the neighborhood of Sault Ste. Marie toward James Bay, and from the neighborhood of North Bay
