EIGHT MEN PERISHED!

Horrible Fate of an Official Exploring Party in Pocahontas Mine.

Man Dropped Bead While Laughing at a Friend's Joke - Boy Burned to Death.

Bluefield, W. Va., Nov. 23.-At 11 o'clock Friday morning Supt. Walter O'Malley, of the Pocahontas Collieries Company, along with State Mine Inspector William Priest, A. S. Hurst, chief coal inspector for the Castner, Curran and Bullit Company, of Philadelphia; Robert St. Clair, chief coal inspector; Morris St. Clair and William Oldham, substitute coal inspectors; Frazier G. Bell, mining engineer, and Joseph Cardwell, manager of the Shamokin Coal and Coak Company, of Maybury, W. Va., composing a party of eight, entered the west main of the Southwest Virginia Improvement Company's collieries for the purpose of examining the true situation in regard to the recent explosion and fire in the Baby mine, and up to midnight, had not been heard from.

At 6 p.m. a party consisting of experienced miners led by Assistant Superintendent King entered the mine to rescue the lost party of eight, but at 6:45 they returned, having encountered such quantities of black damp as to make it impossible to enter any distance into the mine. Assistant Superintendent King was completely overcome by the gas.

THE DEAD BODIES FOUND. Bluefield, Nov. 24.-The dead bodies of the lost party of eight men who entered the west mine of the Pocahontas Collieries Company on Friday morning were recovered at 12:45 o'clock today. At 7 o'clock this morning a rescuing party, numbering 40 persons, entered at the main entrance, brattleing the mine as they went, in order to improve the circulation of the air. They had reached a distance of 3,000 feet from the entrance when they encountered such quantities of white damp that it was impossible to proceed further. Retracing their steps they decided to make another attempt from the Tug River entrance, some six miles across the Flat Top mountain. They went in this entrance about 10:30 o'clock, and after going a distance of 600 feet, found the dead bodies of A. S. Hurst, chief inspector; Bob Odham, sub-inspector, and Frazier G. Bell, mining engineer, all huddled together. From their positions they must have met death suddenly and without pain. All of them were lying face down with no signs of a struggle. Hurst had made a pillow of his coat, on which his head rested. The bodies of other members of the party-Supt. of Mines Walter O'Malley, Joseph Cardwell, superintendent of the Shamokin Coal and Coak Company; R. E. St. Clair, sec-Tound several hundred feet back in the mine, three of the bodies lying some little distance apart. Bob St. Clair and Jos. Cardwell were lying with arms clasped around each other, cold in death. The bodies of O'Malley, Maurice St. Clair and Price were discolored and bruised about the face, showing signs

HON. DAVID MILLS ON LORDS' DECISION

Growing Tendency to Uphold Provincial

Jurisdiction-Goldwin Smith's Views.

Toronto, Nov. 25 .- The Toronto Mail's Ottawa special says: The minister of justice was asked what he thought of the decision of the judicial committee. He said he was satisfied that the judgment, reversing by that of the court of King's bench of Manitoba, established the principle of provincial jurisdiction. cision of the judicial committee was in the case of Russell vs. the Queen, and that upheld Dominion jurisdiction. Since then the decisions have gradually been getting farther and farther away from the decision in Russell vs. the Queen, and I think it now is pretty clear that the power in the provinces to prohibit is pretty well established, and that Russell vs. the Queen can no longer be regarded as good law.

"I have not read over, with care, the Manitoba statue, and I have not a very distinct recollection of the points submitted to the judicial committee of the Privy Council. I was present during much of the argument before the committee, and my impression was that the chief provision of the Manitoba law would be upheld, but it would be necessary to examine with care the Manitoba statue, the points submitted for adjudication, and to read the judgment of the judicial committee before one could say how far the whole question is disposed of by that judgment."

GOLDWIN SMITH.

Prof. Goldwin Smith, when interviewed regarding the important decision rendered by the judicial committee of the Privy Council on the Manitoba liquor act, said he had no doubt as to the correctness of the decision. The judicial committee of the Privy Council is a tribunal of undoubted eminence, and its finding could be accepted without reserve. Then Dr. Smith referred to the part the politicians have played. "It is a warning to the politicians of this country," he said. "They have played fast and loose with the question. The decision of the judicial committee of the Privy Council has left them in a scrape. Now they are in a dilemma, and they deserve it all. may prove a lesson to the politicians not to trifle with such questions." The Hamilton liquor men are de-

cidedly uneasy as a result of the decision of the Privy Council in the Manitoba liquor case, and say that the effect of the decision decreases the value of their property considerably.

Washington, Nov. 25 .- Henson Smith, negro, whose sole claim to fame is that he was shot in the abdomen about the same time as President McKinley, his wounds being almost exactly like those which caused the death of the late president, died Friday at his home near Gaithersburg, Md. His case attracted much interest, as it was thought he would recover. Smith sustained four punctures of the intestines and went six hours without treatment. He was brought to the Emergency Hospital in this city and an operation performed. He recovered so far that he was able to walk when he left the hospital a few days ago, and the physicians say that had he remained there ten days longer he would have com-pletely recovered. Moving around reopened his wounds and he died. Chas. Morris, who shot him, has been indicted for murder at Rockville, Md.

Their Request For Separate Days of Execution Granted-To Be Hanged in January.

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 25.—The fate of three murderers was settled at Harrisburg last week. George W. Mc-Murray will end his days in the penitentiary for the killing of Jas. Rudge, a mine foreman, at Noblestown. This ends one of the most sensational cases that has been before the pardon board for years.

The Biddle brothers, John and Edward, of St. Thomas, Ont., will be hanged within two months for the murder of Grocer Thomas D. Kahney. John Biddle will die Jan. 14 and Edward will follow him to the scaffold two days later, on Jan. 16. The McMurray case has been be-fore the board of pardons at every session since last June, and several times it has been considered at spe-

cial meetings. The aged parents of McMurray spent a fortune to save their son, and just when their resources were exhausted oil was struck on their farm, which gave them fresh funds. When told that his sentence had been commutted to imprisonment for life, the condemned man expressed gratitude.

The cases of the Biddle brothers also excited great interest. They made a fight in the supreme court and lost. Then they petitioned Governor Stone to set separate days for their execu-This was granted. The case of Walter Dorman, their confederate, who became a witness for the state, now remains to be disposed of. He entered a plea of guilty, and the court fixed his crime as murder in the first degree.
