VICTOR EMMANUEL VISITS BERLIN

The Italian Monarch Gets a Cordial Greeting.

TROTS UP UNDER DEN LINDEN

Presented With Address and Bouquet—Many Orders Conferred—Police Precautions.

Berlin, Aug. 29.—The entry of King Victor Emmanuel into the city and his drive through the Unter den Linden yesterday were advanced purposely half an hour over the published time, as a precaution against possible disorder. Consequently, the great crowds which were packed into place an hour before by the police at the Brandenburg Gate were astonished by the arrival at a brisk trot of a gorgeous cavalcade surrounding a six-horse carriage, in which sat Emperor William and a small man in a dark uniform.

The carriage stopped, and the crowds ceased cheering in order to see what would happen. The chief burgomaster, Herr Kishner, advanced and read an address of welcome from a parchment scroll. Behind the emperor stood a hundred, a hundred representatives of the city evening dress. The reading was over in less than a minute. The Italian King then turned to the German Emperor and asked him if he should reply. The Emperor shook his head and the King thereupon shook hands with Herr Kishner and thanked him.

Then a deputation of young ladies advanced on the other side of the carriage and gave the king a pledge of friendship. A bunch of roses. He smiled, bowed, buried his face in the blossoms, handed the bouquet to a lady and the carriage and carriage swept through the gate and down Unter den Linden to the castle, three-quarters of a mile away.

ANOTHER BLOW AT MR. BALFOUR

Unionist Candidate in South Belfast Beaten.

OPPONENT GETS 826 MAJORITY

Comment on Roosevelt Reaffirmation of the Monroe Doctrine—Germany Displeased.

London, Aug. 29.—The result of the election in South Belfast, necessitated by the death of Mr. W. Johnston, of Ballykibbeg (Conservative), who had represented the constituency since 1885, is Mr. T. Sloan, Protestant Association, 3,795; Mr. C. W. Dunbar-Buller (Unionist), 2,968, a majority of 826 for Mr. Sloan.

Local feeling has been strongly stirred by the election, which was very largely an interdenominational fight. Mr. Dunbar-Buller, a County Down landlord and a distant relative of Sir Redvers Buller, represented the old type of Orange Conservatism, and was the official Unionist candidate.

Mr. Sloan was the nominee of the Protestant Association, and Colonel Sanderson has declared that his election would be a "fatal blow" to Orangism. Mr. Sloan is one of the leaders of the Belfast Protestant Association, which gained an unenviable notoriety by the prosecution and conviction of three of its leaders for incitement to riot and an attack upon a Roman Catholic priest in May, 1901. Most of Mr. Dunbar-Buller's meetings have been broken up.

The new member is a working man—a prohibitionist—in favor of compulsory land purchase, and a Wesleyan, and he has denounced the education bill as "a sop to Popery." At the general elections of 1892, 1895 and 1900, Mr. Johnston was returned unopposed. At one meeting in support of the successful candidate Mr. Dunbar-Buller was described as "the nominee of Mr. Arthur James Balfour—the most unprincipled, dangerous and Romancing politician who had sat in the House of Commons since the days of James II. and Judge Jeffreys."

THE MONROE DOCTRINE. While the German press is preoccupied with the honors paid to the Italian sovereign, English journals continue to pay tribute to President Roosevelt's courage and attempt to apply a vigorous reaffirmation of the Monroe doctrine to German colonial intrigues in South America. The Venezuelan boundary and the canal questions have been settled, and the Alaskan frontier dispute has been forgotten. Leading English journals, which a few years ago violently condemned the Monroe doctrine as an exhibition of Yankee braggadocio, now accept it as a policy to which Great Britain has no right to take exception. The Monroe doctrine, according to this view, no longer serves as a barrier to German expansion, but for her disinclination to offend American susceptibilities and add strength to the Monroe doctrine and

WELL GUARDED.

On one side of the thoroughfare outriders, dragons, and lancers lined up to deep making a glittering barrier of order, while on the other side the people's view was unobscured except by extraordinary numbers of police, standing with their faces to the spectators. The soldiers, of course, hurried, because they were ordered to do so, but the cheers of the people were spontaneous and really cordial.

The show was over in a few seconds. Shouting and the successive crushing of bands played intervals between the squadrons of cavalry marked the progress of the King and the Emperor down the avenue. Their majesties drove to the North German Lloyd and the Hamburg-American lines, and then again to the castle in order to receive the diplomatic corps.

Emperor William kept King Victor Emmanuel in the city all night at Potsdam and had him out of bed at 6 o'clock in the morning.

ORDERS CONFERRED.

The visit of King Victor Emmanuel to Emperor William has been marked by the conferring of many orders, including the Order of the Annunziata, which was personally handed by the King to Count Von Buelow. King Victor Emmanuel subsequently lunching at the Italian embassy and received the prominent members of the Italian colony. His majesty afterwards called on Count Von Buelow on Field Marshal Count Von Waldersee, and at several embassies.

The King of Italy proceeded to the royal mausoleum at Charlottenburg in the afternoon, and placed a wreath upon the sarcophagus of William I.

MUTUAL ADMIRATION.

At the state banquet given in the evening, Emperor William, in toast to the King of Italy, said: "The entire fatherland unites with him in shouting this joyous greeting, 'His Majesty, the King of Italy, Hurrah, Hurrah, Hurrah!'"

King Victor Emmanuel, replying to the King of Italy, said: "The feelings of affection expressed by the Emperor were a heavy pledge of friendship, which he reduplicated from the bottom of his heart. 'In token of the brotherly affection uniting our illustrious ancestors, united in the past, united in the future, we will advance in civilization, protected by the old alliance between Italy and two imperial powers, which public opinion now regards as the emblem of peace and its most effective safeguard.'"

Sir Wilfrid Working Hard to Secure Them.
