EACH KILLED BY BULLETS TRAGEDY IN TENDERLOIN

Elopers Found Dead in a Forest in Virginia.

Two Counties Excited by the Evidence of a Double Tragedy.

Richmond, Va., Sept. 29.—Evidence of a terrible tragedy and the clearing up of a mysterious disappearance were brought to light by chance in Sussex County Saturday morning, when the bodies of R. Bannister Mitchell and Miss Mabel Lee were found in the woods. The wandering of a half-starved horse dragging a broken carriage, led to the discovery.

The young couple left Stony Creek, near where Miss Lee lived, in a carriage last Tuesday. The girl's parents were opposed to Mr. Mitchell, and everybody supposed it was an elopement.

Persons living near where the bodies were found saw the couple seated in the carriage Tuesday afternoon engaged in earnest conversation. It is believed Miss Lee wanted to return home and that Mr. Mitchell was unwilling.

Wounds on Miss Lee's body showed that she had been shot four times. Mitchell had received one shot in the head. A pistol was lying on the ground between the bodies, with all the chambers emptied, and another pistol, fully loaded, was found in Mitchell's pocket.

In another pocket was a letter from the young woman refusing to marry Mr. Mitchell as her parents objected. It is believed that he killed the girl and then himself. He had \$354 in his pocket, evidently for the expenses of a trip.

It was supposed by neighbors that the couple had been married, and were spending their honeymoon without letting their friends know their whereabouts. The finding of their bodies caused intense excitement in two counties, where Mitchell and Miss Lee were widely known.

CRUELY KILLED IN AN ALLEYWAY

Another Murder. Mystery in Darkest Chicago.

A YOUNG WOMAN IS THE VICTIM

Hilda Swanson Mutilated in a Most Shocking Manner—No Arrests Made.

Chicago, Sept. 27.—The Record-Herald says: A murder mystery of a most appalling sort developed last night with the discovery of the body of a young woman in the alleyway between Chicago avenue and Larrabee street. Suggestive of the dark crimes of London in the "Ripper" days, when both the high and the lowly fell before the clutches of an unknown assassin, this tragedy for hours following its inception baffled the keenest officers of the East Chicago avenue police station.

The remains of a woman, aged about 25 years, well garbed and with features marked with traces of refinement, were stumbled over by a teamster named James Murphy, sometimes called Pink, at 9:50 o'clock in the alley at the rear of a blacksmith shop at the southwest corner of Chicago avenue and Larrabee street.

Murphy was able to claim the favor of the police by quickly hurrying to the East Chicago avenue station and telling of what he had seen in the alley.

Murphy declared he had started in the alley to make a short cut home, and in the profound darkness that hung over the place had not noticed anything in his way and had thus tripped over the woman's remains. He was ordered held by Lieut. Miller.

Peter Schaus was the first officer to make a careful survey of the body as it lay in the mud near an empty wagon that stood near the blacksmith shop. Blood was flowing from the woman's mouth. Her skirt was partly wrenched off, her hands were seemingly clutching at something for the fingers were buried in the ooze. Finger marks were found on the neck under either ear. There were bruises near, but above, the elbow of each arm—indicating that the woman had been seized roughly, the police thought, before she had been thrown to the ground and choked.

A physician who saw the body when it came in and examined it pretty thoroughly declared that it was his opinion the woman had died from shock.

Detectives Garrigan and Jackson were among the first to go out on the mystery, and they soon gathered in the assistant bridge tender at the Erie bridge, named John Herrity. Herrity viewed the body and said he knew the woman.

"It's her," said Herrity. "Who?" asked Detective Jackson. "Why, Hilda Swanson," answered the bridge tender. That is all he knew, apparently.

The dead woman, it seems, had been in the habit of visiting the bridge tender at night and drinking with him, and there talking and drinking with men who make the place a rendezvous. It is supposed the bridge tender and the woman were lovers.

The police believe she was killed either on her way to the bridge house or on coming away from it. Some one of the bridge house party may have followed her after she left the house. The scene of the crime was favorable to such a criminal act.

COOLLY KILLED HIS WIFE

New York Theatrical Manager Confessed Murder.

New York, Sept. 27.—Harry Rose, stage manager of the Garrick theater, shot and instantly killed his wife to-day in their apartments in West Thirty-third street. Immediately afterward he surrendered himself at the nearest police station, where he handed the revolver to the sergeant saying: "I have just shot my wife."

Jealousy was the cause of the tragedy, Rose, according to his statement to the police, having detected his wife in an intrigue with a man named Charles Zimmerman, whose husband is a partner in the Philadelphia firm of Nixon & Zimmerman. The odor of burning flesh attracted the attention of the occupants of the upper part of the house early in the morning and led to the discovery by detectives of the nude and headless body of a man in the basement. The man was discovered a few minutes later in the furnace, in which a fire had been recently made, with the evident intention of destroying all possibility of identification of the remains. Later the body was identified by Walter Craft, of Glen Cove, as that of his father.

The murdered man was about 51 years of age and was a manufacturer of refrigerating machinery in Cortlandt street, this city.

Tobin, who is charged with the murder, was caught hiding in the house. The police also arrested Alexander McAnerney, the bartender, Robert Kelly, a porter in a Chinese restaurant in the building, and several women who were known to be frequenters of the place. The police say that Tobin's real name is Thomas Kelly and that he is a brother of the porter Kelly.

He also learned that Craft attempted to get a check for \$1,250 cashed before he went to the Empire. A woman named Marnie Moore, who is known to have been in the place with Craft and who is held as a witness, made an important statement which the police decline to make public. She is said to have implicated McAnerney as an accomplice of Tobin. There are now 29 homicide cases in the Tombs, including Mollieux and the recent acquisition, Young, the alleged murderer of Mrs. Pulitzer.

Lord's Day Observance.

Toronto, Sept. 29.—The attorney-general's department is going to put its official foot down heavily on all Sabbath breaking, as defined by the causes of the Lord's Day Act in operation in this province. Today the country crown attorney in Chatham was asked by the department to prosecute the beet sugar companies which, in the erection of mills, had employed Wallaceburg and Dresden respectively, have employed Sunday labor. Further prosecutions are likely to be announced.

Burglars Got \$700.

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 29.—It turns out that the burglars at Snowflake on Friday secured over \$700 from Theil's safe, mostly in bills, not difficult to negotiate. It is believed the thieves are heading for North Dakota. The work was that of old hands at the business.

VERDICT FOR DEFENDANT

End of the Ottawa Libel Suit—East Hastings Protest Dropped.

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—The jury at 9 p.m. Saturday returned a verdict for defendant.

Belleville, Ont., Sept. 26.—The appeal against the return of E. Gus Porter, M. P. for West Hastings, came up before Chief Justice Falconbridge and Justice Street. No one appeared for the petitioner, Cornelius Minin, W. Carroll represented Mr. Porter. The case was dismissed without costs.

ARE UNDER QUARANTINE

Hog Cholera Prevalent in Two Essex Townships.

Names of Farmers Whose Herds Have Had To Be Slaughtered.

Windsor, Ont., Sept. 27.—The hog cholera outbreak in the Township of Tilbury East is reaching large dimensions. The disease first made its appearance on the farm of George Adams, on Aug. 22, and since that time the herds owned by 20 farmers have been slaughtered owing to the ravages of the disease.

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DOWIE'S CREDIT BADLY IMPAIRED

Chicago's Prophet Said To Be Facing a Crisis.

ELIJAH II. NEAR END OF ROPE

Wholesale Firms Said to Have Refused to Supply Zion Stores With Goods.

Chicago, Sept. 29.—"Prophet" John Alexander Dowie, head and founder of the "Christian Catholic Church" and Zion City, Ill., professed "faith healer" and reincarnation of the Hebrew prophet Elijah, is facing a financial crisis which may bring all his enterprises tumbling about his sanctified ears within a short time, so it is said. The Inter Ocean says:

"Tumors of a financial crisis in the affairs of John Alexander Dowie, which for weeks have been general in the country surrounding Zion City, were given further impetus by a secret meeting of the 'healer' and his followers at the other end of the city, which has come from this meeting indicates that Dowie is in worse financial straits than his officers or followers ever realized."

"The meeting was held in Shiloh Tabernacle in Zion City. The strictest precautions were taken that it should be secret and that only 'members in good standing,' who were not in arrears for tithes or offerings, should be admitted. A newspaper reporter managed to elude the guard and remain at the meeting until his identity was discovered and he was escorted to the Zion City police station by the police of 'Elijah II.'"

"The inhabitants of Dowie's city are under obligations to purchase their supplies from the general stores of which Dowie is the proprietor. Through this commercial activity he increases the revenues of the church considerably. The general stores are said to have been the first to feel the financial stringency which has hampered Dowie recently as he assumed the increasing responsibilities of paying for his city and establishing the Zion City lake industries."

"The Zion City general stores are dependent on the wholesale houses of Chicago. The majority of these do not consider Dowie or his followers as factors in their business, and insist on a strict commercial basis when selling to the stores of 'Elijah II.' It is this dependence of the Zion City stores on the outside world which is said to have precipitated the trouble. As the demands on Dowie for cash became daily more numerous, it is said that the general stores have gradually increased the terms which they deemed necessary to discount their bills."

"Their credit is believed to have finally fallen so low that several wholesale firms refused to supply them with goods. One firm is reported to have taken steps to recover goods which it had already delivered to the stores."

The waiting credit was the cause of the meeting of the other evening. Dowie made a supreme effort to secure pledges of great sums of money to tide his enterprise over the present trouble. WOODS' FAIR

St. Louis Bootlers.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 29.—Developments in the "hoodie" investigation were sensational Saturday, subpoenas were served on the late Dr. D. D. D., at the instance of Circuit Attorney E. C. Campbell, and William Reed, his cashier, to appear in court with two checks aggregating \$4,500, dated and endorsed, and payable to Ed Butler, a prominent local politician, and to explain the purpose for which the checks were drawn. It was found, on investigation by the grand jury, that both the checks had been cashed and returned to Broker Campbell. The date of these checks was the same as the day on which the ten-year lighting system of the House of Delegates, for which nineteen members are said to have received \$2,500 each for their votes. Up to a late hour deputy sheriffs were unable to serve the subpoenas.

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
