WILL TAKE ITS TIME

Names Were Submitted for a Successor to Rev. Canon Hague.

A deputation from the vestry of Memorial Church, consisting of Chancellor V. Cronin, D. H. Howden, W. Scarratt, T. Trevelyan, Dr. R. W. Shaw, W. Wright and others, visited Bishop Williams yesterday afternoon and submitted the names of several clergymen to be the successor of Rev. Canon Hague, who recently left for Toronto.

His lordship also submitted various names for the consideration of the parish.

The whole question was discussed at some length, and it was decided not to make a selection at once, but defer the choice for three or four weeks.

The committee refused to make known the names, but it is understood that many prominent clergymen in this and other dioceses are being considered.

EASTERN ENGINEERS

DEMAND INCREASE

But It Is Generally Believed That Railways Will Refuse.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, Jan. 25. — Locomotive engineers on all railroads in the eastern territory have made demands for a general increase in wages ranging from 15 to 25 per cent. The demands involve all railroads east of Chicago and north of the line of the Norfolk and Western Railway and of the Ohio River.

Letters from brotherhood officials to the presidents of these railroads demand increased wages in varying scales, the object being to standardize the wage scale on all lines in this territory, as was done by the trainmen and conductors in 1910.

The General Managers' Association has been asked to appoint a committee to negotiate with a committee of the brotherhood in order that the question can be dealt with collectively. Railroad men who have discussed the demand of the engineers believe that the time is inopportune for a movement of this kind, and are inclined to think that railroads will not grant the demands.

SCHOOL CASE BEFORE COUNTY COUNCIL

West Nissouri Continuation Trouble Engaged Councillors Yesterday Afternoon.

DEBATE WAS VERY LIVELY

Much Interest Was Shown in the Matter of Appointment of a Trustee by the Council.

Deputations for and against the West Nissouri Continuation School occupied a great proportion of the attention of the county council at yesterday afternoon's session. John McFarlane, E. McLeod, Walter Bryan, W. McGuffin, Joseph Vining and R. Wright appeared to ask the council to reappoint a trustee on the continuation school board favorable to their side of the question.

Mr. James Henderson asked for the appointment of the trustee nominated by Reeve Fitzgerald.

Mr. Henderson thought it was not fair for the whole township to pay the same rate as the vicinity of Thornedale. His side also wanted representation on the school board, so that the side favorable to the school could not spend money as freely as they liked.

Councillor Linden, of Wardsville, asked: "Are you not asking us to appoint a trustee in direct opposition to the school?"

"That's about what it simmers down to," admitted Mr. Henderson.

To Block the School.

Here Mr. McGuffin, a member of the other deputation, broke in.

"Is it not your expressed purpose to have three men appointed on the board to block the school? Isn't it true that your candidate, Mr. Salmon, has contributed towards fighting the school?"

Mr. Henderson said it was not true, but that he didn't want this controversy.

Councillor McDonald declared that there was something back of it all that was not being divulged.

"There is a man sitting in this room who knows more than has been told. Who is paying the costs of these lawsuits?" he asked.

"An 'I' the man," Mr. McDonald asked Councillor Fitzgerald.

"I am not going to say any more," replied Councillor McDonald.

Mr. McLeod declared that the opponents of the school proposition had fought it unfairly, that among their arguments against it had been the one that education is demoralizing.

Two Against School.

Mr. O'Brien said that already the reeve of West Nissouri had appointed two men against the school to represent the township. If the county appointed another man, nominating Reeve Fitzgerald, a deadlock among the six members of the school board would result.

Here the discussion was laid over, and other business was named, but later in the afternoon when county trustees were being appointed for the other high schools two motions were made and both quickly referred to the committee on education.

Richard Fitzgerald, seconded by Frank Noyes, moved that John W. Salmon be appointed trustee of the West Nissouri High School.

On the motion of Councillor Morgan, who pointed out that as yet this school did not exist, it was referred to the committee.

It was then moved by Mr. McDonald, and seconded by Mr. Morgan, that Mr. Joseph Vining be reappointed school trustee. Mr. Morgan then moved that this resolution also be referred to the committee.

Other Appointments.

County trustees for the other schools were appointed as follows: John Thompson for Glencoe High School, on motion of Councillors Currie and McFarlane.

Peter Lindsay for Parkhill High School, on motion of Councillors Munro and McGuffin.

R. J. Avery for Strathroy Collegiate.

Capt. Ward had been a well-known figure in the city's life for a great number of years, and his roll of honor as a savior of human beings from death by drowning is second to none in Canada. In his early days a lake fisherman and a famous sailor, he took up his abode at the eastern extremity of what was then called "Hawthorn Island" over 20 years ago, and had lived at the spot until very recently, when failing health made him relinquish active work. With his family, Capt. Ward was in charge of the life-saving station from its inception to its abandonment, through a long period of years, during which he and his sons led a life of adventure such as seldom comes within the experience of the average Toronton-

A New Bridge.

J. A. McGuffin and John Stewart appeared as a deputation to urge the building of the Olney bridge, which Mr. Stewart pointed out would bring some farmers fourteen miles nearer to London market on the round trip. Now there is only the Muncy bridge crossing the Thames between Caradoc and Delaware.

Councillor Hardy, seconded by Councillor Beach, moved that the council proceed with the erection of the bridge. There was no opposition, and the matter was left with the board of road directors to carry out.

Councillor Currie moved that a grant of \$5,000 be made to Glencoe for improvements to the main street of the village, Glencoe to pay two-thirds of the cost of the improvements. It was pointed out that it was unlikely that the entire sum would be required. The motion was referred to the road directors' committee.

Committees Adopted.

The report of the striking committee was adopted without alteration or comment, all the committees being appointed as arranged.

The report on equalization was laid over until another day.

Communications were read from the Children's Aid Society, asking for an increased grant, amounting to \$100 in all, and from Mrs. Robert Colby, asking for a continuance of the county grant towards the maintenance of her children. These communications were referred to committee.

A free peddler's license will be granted to Leonard Munna, a cripple, who thus manages to support himself.

Mr. Frank Judd, of the St. James' Tennis Club, asked the council for the use of the court house for tennis courts for 1912. The matter was referred to the jail committee.
