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### FOR THE PRINCIPLE BUT OPPOSE BASIS

Returns From Montreal Presbyterian Churches on Church Union.

Montreal, March 28.—The returns from the Montreal Presbyterian churches on the union vote have now been compiled, and show a majority against the basis under consideration, though a strong vote in favor of the principle of union.  
Out of 514 members of the session, consisting of ministers and elders, 256 have voted in favor of the general principle of union, but only 215 in favor of union on the basis under consideration. On the other hand, 134 have voted against union on any terms, and 107 against union on the terms proposed.  
Out of the 14,901 communicants in the presbytery at last report, 4,297 have voted for the principle of union, but only 3,718 for the basis as it stands; 1,917 have voted against the principle of union, and 1,525 against union on the basis named.  
Out of 835 adherents voting, 655 are in favor of the principle of union, but only 590 in favor of the terms now before the churches.

### ELOPING WIFE CAUSE OF SUICIDE

Millionaire Hichborn Shoots Himself Following Wife's Disappearance.

Washington, March 28.—Phillip Hichborn, a millionaire in his own right, and a member of one of the oldest and wealthiest families in Washington, was found dead in his bath room at 6:30 last night, having shot himself with a 32-calibre revolver. Despondency caused by his wife running off with Horace Wylie, a prominent clubman and social favorite, is presumed to have been the cause. Mrs. Hichborn is a beautiful woman, about 35 years of age. Both Hichborn and Wylie were over 40 years old. The eloping couple are supposed to be in Europe. In December last Hichborn filed a suit for absolute divorce. Mrs. Hichborn was the daughter of the late Henry M. Hoyt, former solicitor-general of the United States.

### BLACK HAND BOMB

Rochester, March 28.—Black Hand agents shook up Oak street at midnight by exploding a bomb in the doorway of a meat market on that thoroughfare, partially wrecking it. The building is owned by Pasquale De Florio, who lives with his family in the rear. They were thrown from their beds, but not seriously injured.

### PARISIAN WOMEN ARE ALWAYS PRETTY

Only Ugly Women In France Are Fools, Says Author-ess of That Country.

Paris, March 28.—Mme. Marcelle Tinayre, the charming French authoress, gave a brilliant "conference" on "La Parisienne" a few days ago at the Grand Theatre Gras of Nantes. Here is the delicate portrait she traced of her subject: "The true Parisienne is not the dangerous siren of the novels. If I told you she is an angel or a saint you would not believe it; she is a woman—the most womanly of women—and that tells you everything; her qualities, her defects, her character and her physical type."  
"She is not particularly beautiful. The regular features so common in the provinces of the Midi and the robust figures of the women of the north are rare in Paris. The majority of Parisiennes are of mixed origin. Nearly all of them are the offspring of provincial families. It is the climate, the mode of living, the

atmosphere of Paris that fashion the Parisienne.  
"Beautiful? No. Pretty? Nearly always, and without beauty never ugly. The only ugly women in France are the fools. The Frenchwoman—and especially the Frenchwoman of Paris—is made of a matter more supple, more malleable than other women. Is she dark or fair? Who knows? She is that which it pleases her to be, and most often she keeps that discreet, chestnut shade, so convenient, which is dark in the shadow, fair in the light and goes well with any hat. She is not very tall. That would be awkward for the years when the fashion suits little women. Her body, elastic and resisting, is clay which she molds at her fancy, and her pretty eyes neither blue nor gray, nor black, nor green, have the color of her emotions and caprices, the color of the changing Seine under the variable sky of Paris."

### GRAIN MEN PEEVED.

Montreal, March 28.—The local grain men are highly indignant over the announcement that was made this morning by the local harbor commissioners that the rates for the use of the grain elevators under their control would be raised next month. The new price is 1 6-10c per bushel, as against 9-10 of a cent per bushel in Boston. New York's rate is 1 1-2c per bushel, and New York. The old price here was 9-10 of a cent per bushel.

### ITALIAN MINERS ARE SAILING FOR HOME

Expect Long Suspension, and Living in Italy Is Much Cheaper.

New York, March 28.—More than one thousand miners from the anthracite and bituminous fields have sailed from New York to Italy and other European countries within the last week. They have left their work in anticipation of a suspension of mining, believing that even though an agreement is reached, it will be fully a month before all the collieries start up. The men know that in event of a strike following the automatic suspension now certain to come, they will be called upon to give financial aid to the union, and the prospect does not please the frugal ones, who have saved their money, and are able to take vacations. Furthermore they prefer to be idle in Italy, where it costs less to live.

### MAX FREEMAN SUICIDED.

New York, March 28.—Max Freeman, an actor, 50 years old, committed suicide during the night by hanging himself in the room of a Seventh avenue hotel.

### LAST OF ALLEN GANG CORNERED IN HILLS

Detectives Expect To Round Them Up Within Few Hours.

Hillsville, Va., March 28.—"We will get them today," was the promise again this morning of the detectives on the trail of what is left of the Allen gang. Fifty-four men, making their way afoot through thickets or over rough trails, early today began closing in on the spot high up in the Blue Ridge in which Sidna and Friel Allen and Wesley Edwards are now supposed to have found their last hiding place. The leaders thought within a few hours they would either run down the outlaws, or make certain that they had escaped from this section of the country.  
Across the North Carolina line at Mount Airy, Sheriff Haynes, of Surry County, has a posse of 50 men awaiting word to join the Virginia searchers. What use, if any, shall be made of this force will be decided by today's developments.

### AUTO DRIVER RUNS AMUCK AT TORONTO

Hits a Woman and Then Rusher Her to the Hospital.

Toronto, March 28.—A man giving the name of James Radnor, No. 3 Cumberland avenue, was arrested this morning on a charge of running amuck with his automobile, as a result of being intoxicated. Mrs. Mary Hayden, 15 Denison avenue, is in St. Michael's Hospital with a broken arm and internal injuries, received when the automobile struck her as it was swaying from side to side of the driveway on University avenue, as it came down several notches ahead of the speed limit.  
There were four others in the car with Radnor when it struck Mrs. Hayden. They jumped out, so the police claim, and placed the injured woman in the rear seat and then got away. Radnor drove the car to the hospital, and the screams of the woman attracted the attention of the policemen who placed the driver of the car under arrest.
