

General Joffre, Leader of French Troops, Man of Indomitable Will and Great Resource.

Paris, Aug. 6 .- 3:20 p.m .- France's great army has been placed under the supreme command of General Joseph Joffre, who enjoys great popularity with the men as he does with the French nation generally. He is known as a man of strong will and it is a common saying in the army that when General Joffre has once made up his mind nothing will force him to change it. French military men express the fullest confidence in his skill.

General Joffre is 62 years old. He has been married ten years, but is childless. He is of medium height and stout, with a massive head, very fair hair and thick drooping moustache. He is noted for his excellent horsemanship. He was trained as an engineer, and while on duty in Madagascar constructed the harbor of Diego Suarez, the principal one in the island.

The mobilization plans for the French army were drawn up by General Joffre last April, and the results of their execution have exceeded all expectations.

BRITISH CRUISERS GUARD LINER IN NEST OF GERMAN WARSHIPS

New York, Aug. 6.—The captain of the Cunard Liner Pannonia, which arrived in port during the night, said today that his vessel had passed through a zone patrolled by two German warships. Radiograms, in code, passing between them were intercepted. WARNED BY BRITISH.

The Pannonia left Gibraltar July 25, and until she approached this coast the officers had no knowledge of the situation in Europe. Several hundred miles out she received a

message from a British cruiser, warning her to beware of capture. All lights, except those necessary to the navigation of the ship, were immediately extinguished. Early yesterday the Pannonia passed the Lusitania. The ship was dark except for her running lights, and was being driven at high rate of speed. Soon after the Pannonia was in communication with a British warship, which informed her that she might go ahead with-

out fear, as there were several British ships within wireless call.

HEARS GERMAN CRUISER'S WIRELESS. Later the Pannonia's wireless operator heard German cruisers in communication with each other. The Pannonia brought 604 passengers in the first and second cabins.

WARSHIPS OF WARRING NATIONS WATCHING AMERICAN COAST FOR PRIZES

Y., Aug. 6.—The presence close to the American coast of warships of the warring European nations prepared to descend upon and capture the merchant vessels of the opposing belligerents was evidenced today by news of great Atlantic liners arriving at Halifax, N. MAY BE NEXT MOVE IN EUROPE

London, Aug. 6 .- An Exchange Telegraph Company dispatch from Paris today state that Germany has sent an ultimatum to Italy, saying that unless Italy supports her allie war on her will be declared.

The Telegraph, in a late edition today, says it is believed in diplomatic circles that Italy is on the eve of declaring war on Austria. Italy's alliance with Austria was never popular with Italians. POURED HAIL OF BULLETS ON GERMANS AFTER WAITING FOR THEM TO COME UP

Brussels, via London, 11:52 a.m., Aug. 6.—Graphic stories of the great struggle between the Belgian troops and the German soldiery yesterday in the vicinity of Liege, tell of terrific slaughter among the German forces At about noon yesterday the German infantry attempted to carry, by assault, Fort

Barchon, to the northeast of Liege. The attacking infantry crept up under the cover of a heavy artillery fire, but the Belgian defenders reserved their fire until the Germans had come to close quarters, when,

at a given signal, the Belgians opened with a perfect hail of bullets from rifles and machine guns, which wreaked havoc among the Germans. The attackers soon lay in heaps of dead and wounded around the fort. At the same time Fort Chaudfontaine, to the southeast of Liege, kept up a hot fire on

another body of Germans, who had seized a neighboring castle. The Belgian artillery reduced the building to a mass of smoking ruins. The Germans finally retired all along the line. One newspaper says the German losses amounted to between 4,000 and 5,000 men, while they abandoned 17 machine guns.

A squadron of Belgian lancers, according to another report, was completely wiped out, after it had killed 150 German Uhlans.

A force of 20,000 Germans passed through Manhay, Luxemburg, on Wednesday in the direction of Aywaille, Belgium.
