Washington Took First Game of Yesterday's Double Header.

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OVER 100 HORSES ARRIVE FOR QUEEN'S PARK MEETING

Biggest Entry in Years Says Vice-President A. H. Brenner—
London Hunt Club Events Will Be One of Features—
Everything Ready for Opening on Tuesday.

Over 65 horses arrived in the city this morning for the London race meeting, which opens at Queen's Park on Dominion Day and continues until Friday next. These horses did not include the ones which are to arrive from Ayrmer, the meeting these closing yesterday. When these arrive, it is likely that over a hundred horses will be stabled in Queen's Park in preparation for the races.

Biggest Entry in Years.
Vice-President A. H. Brenner, of the London Turf Club, told The Advertiser this morning that the entry list was the biggest in years, and that the coming meeting should be the best ever held in this city. The committee in charge has spared no effort or expense in having everything in ship-shape for the opening on Tuesday afternoon, and one of the biggest opening-day crowds

that ever attended a meeting here should be present.

The Hurdles a Feature.
One of the features of the meeting will be the hurdle races, put on by the members of the London Hunt Club. The London Turf Club has donated four handsome silver cups for these events, one of which will be run off each day of the meeting. These events will all be filled with qualified entries, and their riders will wear the red coat uniform. There will be six hurdles on the field inside the track, and the finish will be made on the track in front of the judge's stand.

The Judges.
The judges for the meeting will be Dr. G. A. Boulton, Billy Robinson and Mr. Lowry, of Sarnia, the presiding judge and starter. Mr. Lowry has been starter at the London races for some years, and has always given the best of satisfaction. The timers will be Messrs. Wilcox, Reid and Trebilcock.

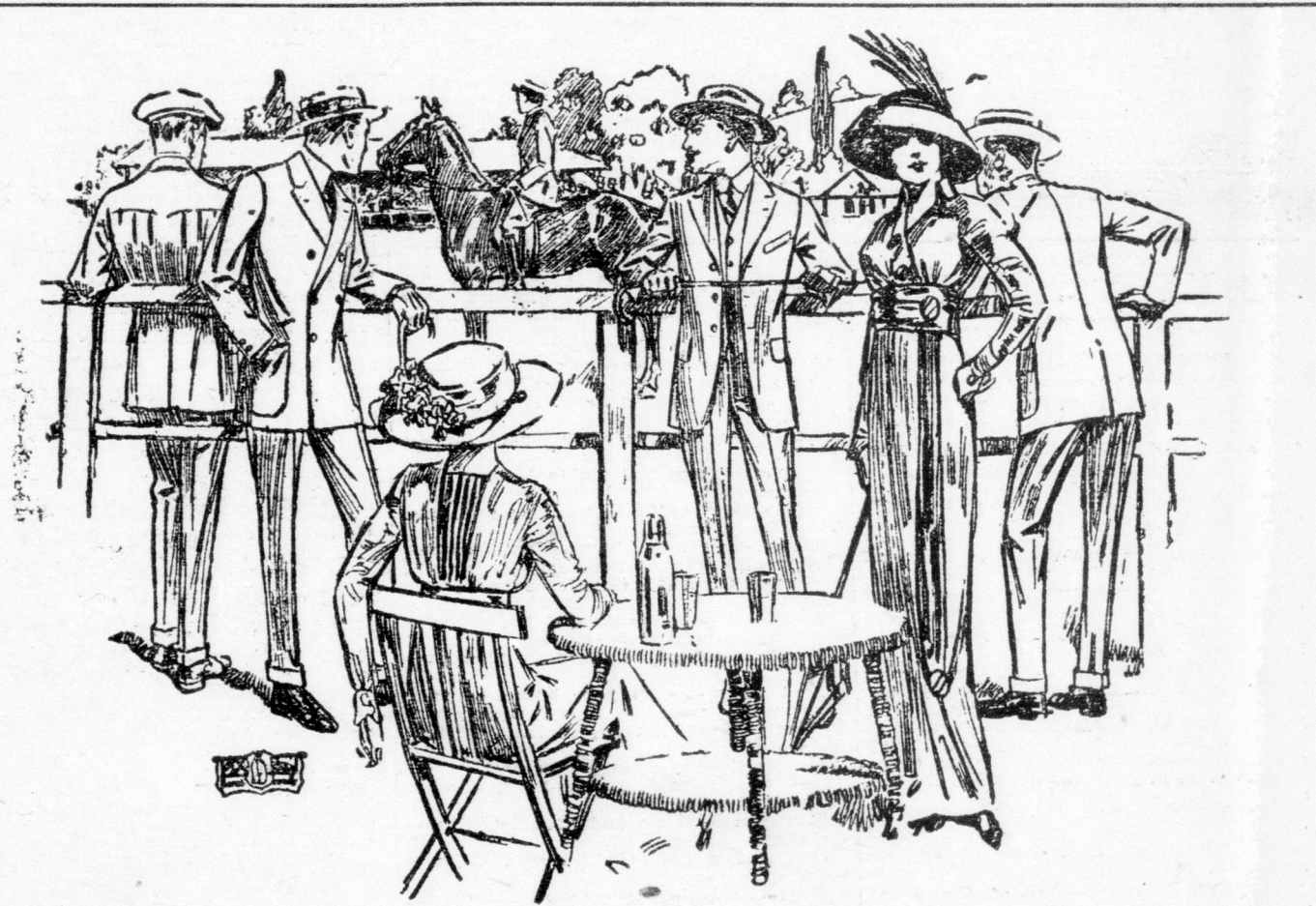

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CHICAGO POLICE

RAID BOOKMAKERS
One Was in Church Attending Graduating Exercises When Arrested.

Chicago, June 28.—Fifty indictments against nineteen handbook makers were the first police of Chief of Police Schuetzler's renewed campaign against all forms of gambling in Chicago. Schuetzler furnished the evidence upon which the horse race gamblers were indicted.

Beats on the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs on May 10 formed most of the evidence furnished by the assistant chief. Detectives were placed in the haunts of the handbook makers, and a detective was sent to Louisville to see the race. In former trials the state has had difficulty in proving that a race on which bets were made here was actually run.

The bookmakers had no warning and were hauled from cigar stores, saloons and barber shops last night. One was arrested in church, where he was attending the graduation exercises of his son.
