

## ROSCOE SARLES BURNS TO DEATH

Famous Automobile Racer  
Dies in Crash On Kansas  
City Speedway.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 17.—Roscoe Sarles of Indianapolis, veteran automobile racer, was burned to death in the 300-mile race, dedicating the new Kansas City speedway today when his car crashed into that of Pete De Paolo, and was wrecked. Sarles car jumped the top rail at

the northeast corner of the speedway and dropped 25 feet pinning him beneath the wreckage. Sarles, known as the "clown of the races" was driving for Cliff Durant of Los Angeles, who decided at the last minute not to drive. Pickup, his mechanic, was injured severely.

Four other drivers were injured severely and two slightly in the race, which was won by Tommy Milton of Los Angeles. Milton's time was 2:46:52.96; Harry Hartz finished second, time 2:47:10.48; Frank Elliot of Kansas City, third, time 2:49:46.60; Ralph Mulford, fourth, time 2:50:45.38; and Jerry Wunderlich, fifth, time 2:55:46.47.

Paolo and his mechanic, Henning, sustained severe injuries when they attempted to dodge a wheel

thrown by Eddie Hearn's car. De Paolo's injuries had not been determined tonight, but physicians expressed the fear that he was injured internally.

## SWITCHMAN AT GUELPH KILLED IN FREIGHT YARD

GUELPH, Sept. 17.—Joseph E. Hopon, 23 years old, a yard switchman on the Grand Trunk, was instantly killed in the freight yard last Saturday, when he was crushed by two cars while at work.

He attempted to climb aboard one car while it was passing a switch, and before he reached the top another car crashed into him.

He was a single man, and a native of New Hamburg. Coroner Mackinnon is conducting an inquest here.

## PREMIER KING LAUDS WORK OF YORK PIONEERS

Stresses Necessity For Respect For Memory of Early Canadians.

SPEAKS AT SHARON RALLY

Points To Symbolism of Temple Built One Hundred Years Ago.

SHARON, Sept. 17.—(By Canadian Press).—The necessity of respect for the pioneers of Canada, for the effective and splendid work accomplished by them, was stressed by Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, premier of Canada, here yesterday at the annual celebration of the York Pioneers in the Sharon Temple. Mr. King drew a word picture of the trials and difficulties of the early settlers in Canada, and urged that the present generation should ever strive to be worthy of the deeds of those who first fought and conquered the forests and wilderness.

The pioneers had striven in the cause of freedom, freedom of land, freedom to worship as seemed best to them. They had cleared the land, cultivated their farms and left behind them a history which must be deemed sacred.

What was true of the first settlers in Ontario was also true of Quebec. It was for the present generation to see to it that the high standards and the spirit which animated the men and women of the past were maintained and passed on to future generations. The prime minister pointed to the construction of Sharon Temple more than 100 years ago as symbolic of this spirit. Even the shape of the temple was symbolic, the three stories representing "The Father and Son and Holy Ghost," and with the interior pillars each representing one of the twelve apostles. Of the four doors, one faced north, another south, the third east, and the fourth west, so that the people could enter from whatever direction they pleased.

Also symbolizing the spirit of the pioneers was the establishment of the first technical school in Sharon about the time the temple was built, and the school where girls were instructed in household duties. The first organ to be made in Canada for church purposes was also made at Sharon and established in the temple. No country which did not respect its history could be great.

H. C. Hocken, M.P., also urged the necessity of maintaining the spirit of the early pioneers and the value of history. This theme was again stressed by J. L. Hughes, president of the York Pioneers, and by Hartley Dewart, M.P.

## DELIVERS SERMON ON FOUR GOSPELS

Rev. Quintin Warner Returns To Cronyn Church After Months' Absence.

After an absence of nine weeks from his pulpit, due to illness, Rev. Quintin Warner once more took charge of the service at Cronyn Memorial Church Sunday morning. Mr. Warner has spent the last two weeks on a motor trip to Montreal, and in reference to this he spoke the following few words:

"During my absence from this city I have visited many churches, and I can say this morning with the utmost truth that there is no place like home. The people of this congregation should be proud of the fact that they have a beautiful church, for beauty is essential in the worship of God—we worship God in the beauty of holiness."

"I have never found much difficulty in choosing a text for a sermon on the first Sunday of a season, for it is then that the activity of a church begins," were the opening words of Mr. Warner's sermon. "Such is the present case, and I wish to make a few remarks on the subject of the gospels of the Bible."

Other Gospels Discarded. "The four gospels, according to Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, are the results of a series of eliminations which have been continually made since very early times, and they are the only ones which bear absolute truth as to the life and teachings of Jesus Christ. A number of other gospels were once in existence, which made our Saviour appear childish, using His divine power for frivolous purposes. These have since been discarded from our Bible as spurious and utterly unnecessary."

"No book has ever been more essential to mankind and more widely read than the four gospels. It is they which have encouraged and scattered Christianity. Yet the gospel upon which Christianity really depends today is the gospel according to you and me."

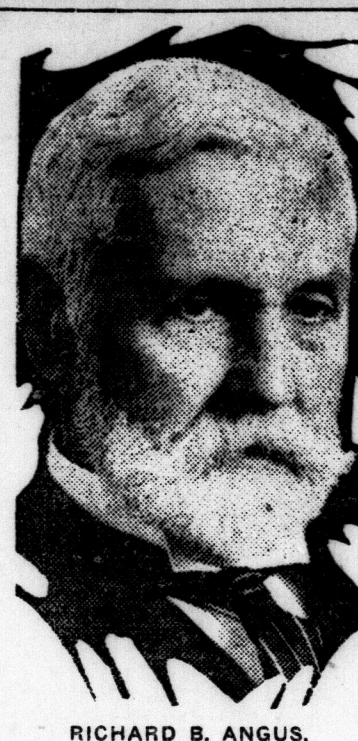
"It is not what has happened in the ages past that impresses the people most. It is the acts of the Christians of today which influence the people toward supporting Christianity. The smile of friendliness on a human face, the few words of kindness in time of trouble, the helping hand in the time of need—these do much for bringing people under the wings of Christianity and for making them believe in the divine fatherhood of God."

Must Be Open to All.

"The gospel, according to yourself, must be open to all to read. It does not need to be translated into various languages, for it is written in the language of smiles and tender feelings. It does not have to be copied from the old worn parchment. It is written on the face of every good Christian."

"Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is being written in the lives of all Christians—that is what the gospel, according to you and me should show."

## Financier Passes

MONTREAL, Sept. 17.—Richard Angus, past president of the Bank of Montreal, a director of that institution and one of the directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway and many other large corporations, died early this evening at his country home at Sennerville, near Montreal, in his 92nd year.

From a \$10-a-week clerk to builder of a continent. That was the rise of R. B. Angus, Grand Old Man of Canada. When a youngster, he got a job in a bank. He kept his eyes open, used his brains and soon won promotion. In 12 years he was general manager of the institution. Then he became its president and made it one of the greatest organizations of North America.

His patience and genius for finance coupled with the daring of George Stephen and Donald Smith, linked the Atlantic with the Pacific by rail, made the confederation of the Canadian provinces possible and laid the foundation of the largest railway in the world—the Canadian Pacific.

## DENT WILL FACE MURDER CHARGE

Accused Slayer of Peter Egoian To Be Tried At Brantford.

Still Maintains Innocence and Fails To Secure Legal Adviser.

BRANTFORD, Sept. 17.—Harry Dent, the accused murderer of Peter Egoian, will appear at the sittings of the supreme court here tomorrow. Justice W. R. Meredith is the presiding judge.

It is expected that the case will last two or three days as there is a host of new evidence that is to be heard, including the reports of the Dominion analysts. It will be remembered that Dent was found in the possession of a portion of the dismembered body of Egoian on the night of April 25 and that when searched he had much of Egoian's personal property in his possession, including the latter's pay check from the city treasurer.

Dent, right up until the present, maintains that he is innocent of the crime, and according to the police and county court officials he has not had a legal adviser appointed and the local Armenian people refuse to have anything to do with him.

In a great many cases the Armenian people maintain that he is not one of them, but that he is a Turk, and that they will not support him in any way. They all speak very highly of Egoian.

According to the Armenian people of this city they claim that the accused's name is not Dent, but that it is Harry Vaghazianian. The wife of the accused still languishes in the hospital for the insane at Hamilton, while their children are under the care of the local Children's Aid Society.

In the event of Dent being convicted of the crime the children will be more or less orphans as the mother is practically a raving maniac, although she has at times acted very normally, according to reports.

## FAIR AT OTTAWA BREAKS 1921 ATTENDANCE RECORD

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.—With fair weather conditions prevailing the Central Canada Exhibition broke another attendance record when 49,000 persons passed through the gates yesterday. This is 9,000 more than was recorded by the turnstiles on the same day last year.

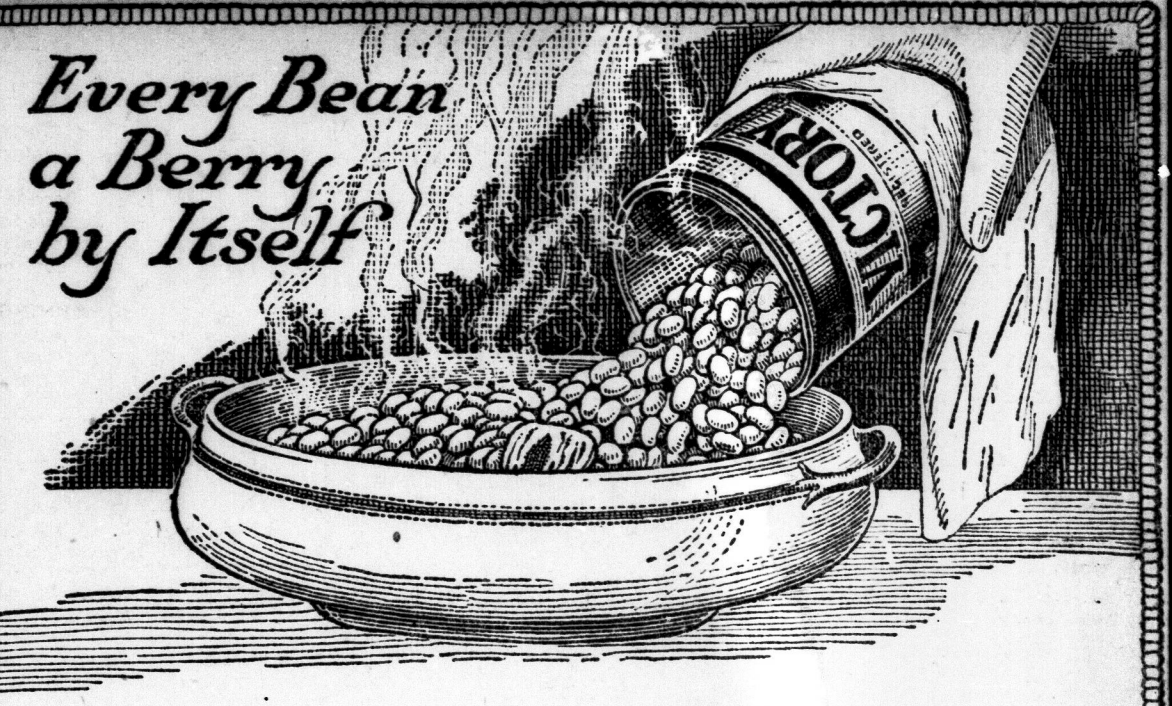
