Young Bandit Wanted Here On Murder Charge, Held By Police of Susanville

Melbourne Bank Bandit, Sidney Murrell, Placed Under Arrest by California Authorities On a Charge of Robbery—Finger Prints Are Sent to Ottawa, Where They Are Identified.

MADE ESCAPE FROM THE MIDDLESEX JAIL

Sidney Murrell, Melbourne bank bandit, wanted for murder here, has been captured in Susanville, California.
Ottawa authorities identified the finger prints sent by the sheriff of Lassen County, California, in which Murrell was arrested on a charge of burglary, as those of the desperado who made a sensational break from the Middlesex County Jail September 2, 1931.

Murrell is at present on remand in the Lassen County Jail awaiting further word from the local authorities. As late as last evening, the sheriff of the California county wired Chief of Police Robert Birrell, for further particulars about the prisoner, and for a detailed description.

This week Sidney Murrell was taken into custody by Lassen County officers on a charge of robbing a house. Officers in Susanville, the county seat where the jail is located, compared the stranger's description with that on the circular sent out by the London police and found a close resemblance.

Finger prints were taken and forwarded to Ottawa. Comparison showed the prints to be those of Sidney Murrell.

Police here have wired Susanville authorities to hold the prisoner for further instructions, and have forwarded the detailed description for which the California police asked. Sidney Murrell was one of a gang of four gunmen who robbed the Melbourne branch of the Home Bank of Canada on the morning of Monday, April 10, 1931. It was during their attempt to escape after the robbery that Russell Campbell was shot to death.

Campbell was one of a number of villagers who attempted to intercept the escape of the bandits from the bank. The gang included Sidney Murrell, his brother, William Murrell, Henry Jack (Slim) Williams alias William Henry Vaughan, and a mysterious "Pat" who made good his escape on the day of the robbery.

Murrell's escapades read like a tale from a dime novel, of the Jesse James type. On the night previous to the robbery, the gang walked to Byron, where they stole a touring car from the garage of D. G. Wadsworth. They drove to Melbourne, and at daybreak were parked on the outskirts of the little village, drinking rum. At six o'clock in the morning, one of the gang walked into the bar of the Melbourne Hotel and purchased a package of cigarettes.

At eleven o'clock the gang parked the stolen auto in front of the Home Bank. The four entered the building, one by the side door and the others by the front. Several minutes later, the four emerged, carrying a large trunk. A ladder had been left against the side of the building. The prisoners climbed this to the top of the wall, dropped down to the roof of a tool shed on the outside, and disappeared into the night.

SIDNEY MURRELL, a member of the bandit band that robbed the Melbourne Bank, wanted here on a charge of murder, who has been captured at Susanville, California.
The prisoners had been left alone for a half hour prior to the time they were supposed to be locked in the sleeping compartments of their cell for the night. Turnkeys found the bars had been removed. Their escape was easy. Western had been constructing a machinery shed in the southeast jail yard. A ladder had been left against the side of the building. The prisoners climbed this to the top of the wall, dropped down to the roof of a tool shed on the outside, and disappeared into the night.

SEARCHED COUNTRYWIDE.
For a week police searched the surrounding country. Border police had been wired to watch for the desperadoes.
In all parts of Canada and the United States suspects were arrested during the next few months.

City police sent thousands of circulars to all parts of the world. The Province of Ontario and Middlesex county offered \$4,000 in rewards for the capture of the bandits. A year later part of the reward was withdrawn.

Several months ago, Ontario provincial police inserted an advertisement in The Detective, an official police publication printed in Chicago, offering a reward for the capture of the two men.

Williams' case was adjourned pending further word of the desperadoes.
At a subsequent assize court, Williams pleaded guilty to a charge of robbery with violence and was sentenced to seven years in Kingston Penitentiary. He pleaded not guilty to a charge of murder in connection with the Melbourne robbery. Evidence was not produced in that case when he signified his willingness to admit that a few days previous to the Melbourne robbery, he, in company with the Murrells, robbed a Chinese laundry at the corner of Wharmcliffe road and Beaconsfield avenue, and unmercifully beat the proprietors.

Police have evidence to attach the blame for the Grand Trunk station mail robbery of 1921 to the Murrell brothers. Search of a disused well at the Murrell home in Manor Park resulted in the finding of the strong box which was stolen from the Grand

Trunk station by four masked bandits, after a fight, during the early part of 1921. The loot in this robbery amounted to \$800 cash and many bonds.

Since the Murrells escaped dozens of rumors about them have reached police headquarters.
Will Likely Be Remanded.
The missing fourth man is said to have been seen in Idaho since the robbery, and the Murrells were reported in Texas, Manitoba and Mexico.

Lassen county, where "Sid," the younger of the two brothers is said to have been captured, is in the northeastern part of California, on the border of the Coast Range. Its borders touch Nevada. The county is sparsely populated. Susanville, the county seat, is a small place, but is the largest town in the county.

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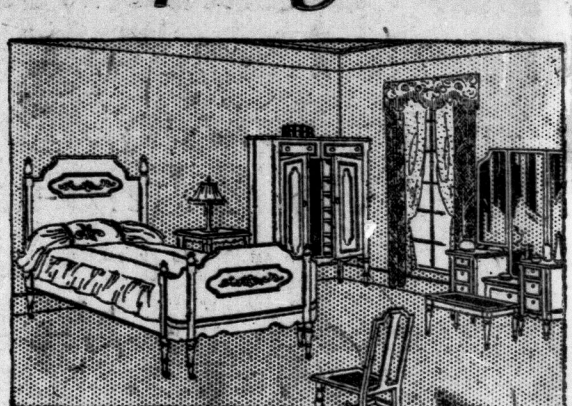

FINED FOR NEGLECTING TO REPORT EACH MONTH
Sarnia, May 25.—Ceal T. Vansickle, Water street, was arraigned before Magistrate Gorman in the city police court today for failing to comply with the provisions of a court order made on Sept. 19, 1932, directing him to report on the first Monday in each month for twelve months to the chief of police. This order was made following a hearing on two charges of forgery, one of which sentence was suspended, and the other reserved. Chief Lamm advised the court today Vansickle had reported in October, November and December of last year, but not since the first of
