Baldwin Sees Turkish Agent In Attempt At Agreement

Associated Press Despatch.

London, Dec. 22.—In keeping with his promise made to the house of commons, Premier Baldwin today had a conference with the Turkish ambassador, Ferid Bey, with the object of reaching a basis for negotiations between Great Britain and Turkey on the Mosul dispute.

The Westminster Gazette says that at today's conference, Mr. Baldwin pointed out to Ferid Bey certain compensations and advantages Turkey would gain from acceptance of the league's decision, the British government being willing to listen to any Turkish proposals for a security pact.

Ferid Bey was given to understand, however, that beyond minor rectifications of the frontier, there could be no question of revising the league council's decision.

The Westminster Gazette expresses the belief that Turkey will not fight, but will adopt a waiting attitude as she did when she was deprived of Smyrna.
