MARRIAGE BREAKS SCHOOL ROUTINE

MARRIAGE BREAKS SCHOOL ROUTINE

Mrs. Rose Objects to Teachers' Matrimonial Ventures in Mid-Term.

BOARD IN QUANDARY

Resignation of Two Accepted As the Only Way Out.

Trustee Mrs. J. A. Rose particularly and the board of education as a whole is strongly opposed to London women teachers resigning at the end of December to get married, thus breaking into the school routine.

Mrs. Rose voiced her objection in no uncertain terms at the regular meeting of the board yesterday when two teachers, one in Victoria public school and one in the east collegiate institute, tendered their resignations to take effect at the close of the fall term at the end of next month.

"It seems to me the board should put a stop to these resignations in the middle of the term," observed Mrs. Rose, "because I don't think it fair to have the school work broken into in this way. If either of these teachers knew she intended to get married in December then I don't think it was fair of them to begin teaching for just three months of the year and I believe that they should be asked to postpone their wedding and finish the year out."

Administrator G. A. Wheable, B.A., and A. E. O'Neill, B.A., principal of the east collegiate, both supported Mrs. Rose in her contention that school work is upset by resignations in the middle of the school year.

Mr. Wheable pointed out that in the public schools there is a contract calling upon resignations to be tendered two months in advance of the closing of school either at December or in June, but Mr. O'Neill stated that there are no such contracts in the secondary schools.

"The board has always been willing to accept any teacher's resignation in case of promotion," remarked Mr. O'Neill, "especially if the promotion was recognized as the chance of a lifetime. It therefore resolves itself into a question whether or not the board views marriage as a promotion."

Finding itself rather helpless, the board decided to accept the two resignations as tendered, incidentally instructing the secretary to forward to each a letter of appreciation for her services while members of the board's staff, but nevertheless the feeling was almost unanimous in the board that in future everything possible should be done to dissuade teachers from resigning in the middle of the year, and particularly so for the purpose of being married.
