Heavy rains have fallen during the last two days, but it is now clearing up.

St. Louis, Oct 26—Phillips, a planter of Shreveport, has arrived from the wreck of the Stonefall, and furnishes the following brief particulars of the terrible disaster.

The boat caught fire about 6 1/2 o'clock on Wednesday evening, about 45 miles above Cairo, in the Mississippi river, from a candle which a deck passenger had near some hay, while playing cards.

The steamer was run aground on a bar, the pilot supposing that the passengers could wade ashore.

Unfortunately at the end of the bar was a slough, where a large number drowned.

The boat was only run upon the bar about two feet, and the shallowest water was about the bow, five or six feet.

There was so much hay on board that the boat burned like tinder.

The Belle of Memphis, came up at 9 1/2 and rendered all the assistance possible.

Of 252 passengers and crew only 30 are known to have been saved.

When last seen, Capt Scott was floating down stream on a log. The people at New's saw the light and hastened to assist.

One man rescued 16 persons with a whip. Had it not been for their help, all would have been lost.

A gentleman from Paducah, Ky, swam ashore with a lady, and after a weary struggle, returned to save a child.

In swimming ashore, he was grasped by a drowning man and would have himself drowned had he not shook him off.

One man was taken from the wreck so badly burned that he died as soon as he reached the shore.

There were 39 cabin passengers, 60 of a crew and quite a number of ladies on board. All were probably lost except one.

The pilot and carpenter were the only ones of the crew saved.
