# DEATH AND RUIN IN STORM TRACK

Sweeping out of the southwest with electrical storm struck the lower end of the Virginia peninsula late today and left a trail of death and ruin. Tonight it was difficult even to learn the numher of dead, for many small craft went down in the storm at various points along the James river and in Hampton

Roads. Conservative estimates placed the dead at not more than 15. None of the bodies have been recovered, and nothing is known here of the identity of the missing persons, as most of them were fishermen from disant counties along the James.
