New York, July 24—The Post states that the report of the post office department shows that the amount of mail matter carried during the year ending June 30, 1881 measured by postal charges was \$42,795,000. The value of stamps of all kinds including postal cards and envelopes was \$34,625,000. That is to say we have a statistical paradox; \$8,170,000 worth more mail matter was carried than was paid for.
