THIRTEENTH YEAR.

A FLAW IN THE CRANK PIN

CAUSES A DISASTROUS WRECK AT THE WATERWORKS.

The Six Hundred Pound Cylinder Head of the New Black Engine blown through the Building by a Force of 60,000 Pounds at Three Men Miraculously Escape With Their Lives.

The Poles seem to be haunting the Waterworks Department these days. Within the last week or so three or four accidents, more vexatious than serious, have happened. The calamities were restricted for last night, when a disastrous mishap occurred to the Black engine at the power house, Esplanade, and some of the employees narrowly escaped instant death.

The engine was started up at 11:15 p.m. At 9:45 o'clock there was a sudden crash, the building shook as if by some seismic influence, and in a twinkling the engine-room was full of steam. When the doors were thrown open and the room cleared of steam it was found that the cylinder head of the high pressure engine had been blown out, with a gaping hole in the 12-inch western wall, large enough for a man to crawl through, told there it had found its billet. Stewards around were pieces of iron, steel and brass.

Nearly every employee of the Black Manufacturing Co., and Mr. William B. Hall, assistant engineer of the Waterworks Department, were in the room at the time of the cylinder head out of range when the accident happened. Had they been a few feet nearer they would have been knocked to pieces. Mr. George Inglis, who represents the George F. Blake Manufacturing Co., was standing near the piston rod at the time, but he was not frightened in getting it away.

A Crank Pin Broke.

The cause of the accident was the breaking of the six-inch crank pin. When the pin snapped the connecting rod dropped. That brought the piston rod up against the front head, stripping the nuts. The steam cracked the piston back, knocking the back head out. The latter weighed about 600 pounds, and the force that sent it from its place and through the brick wall was equal to 60,000 pounds. What the result would have been had any of the employees been in its way may be imagined.

No blame can be attached to anyone. The engine has been running off and on since September, and often at 10 revolutions per minute. The latter week the engine was running one-third through the crank-pin told the it. It will take about a week to repair, and the cost of the damage estimated at \$2000 or \$3000.

Engine No. 3, which was shut down at the time, was started up after superintendent Hamilton had been apprised of the accident.

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MADE A PATH 200 YARDS WIDE

A CYCLONE IN ILLINOIS CAUSES CONSIDERABLE DESTRUCTION.

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NO HARD AND FAST PROPOSALS

Will Be Presented by the American Delegates at the Coming International Monetary Conference.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The India Currency Committee, which it was supposed was expediting its decisions with a view to influencing the International Monetary Conference, adjourned to-day until the conference is over.

A general statement, availing an international agreement will be laid before the conference, and this will lead to debate. The delegates anticipate that the result will be a report signed by the members advising the proposition for an international agreement.

CAUGHT HIS MAN IN MEXICO.

A BANK OF HAMILTON FINGER WING GOT AWAY WITH \$10,000.

Ontario Government Detective Murray traces the man to the Mexican Republic and Takes Him Into Custody—After Another Bank of Hamilton Forger.

During the past few months the funds of the Bank of Hamilton have been relieved of between \$40,000 and \$50,000 by means of forgeries, one of the culprits being C. H. Davidson, the well known nursery firm of C. H. Davidson & Co. of Burlington.

Two Pinkerton detectives have been in the service of the bank for some time endeavoring to bring about the arrest of the culprits, but without success.

The Attorney-General's Department was communicated with and Detective John Murray, who was given charge of the case, learned that Davidson was in Mexico. He started for that country, and a special despatch to the United States was sent, advising the arrest of the forger at Ciudad Juarez, on the Mexican Central Railway.
