

CREEDON TALKS.

THE STUDY AUSTRALIAN IN PRIME
CONDITION FOR HIS CONTEST
WITH FITZSIMMONS.

He Tells Something of His Inner Life—
Makes No Secret of the Means He Em-
ploys to Keep in Shape—His Manager
Does Not Believe in Doctors.

As September 22, the date set for the \$5000 battle between Dan Creedon and John Fitzsimmons, grows nearer its uncertainty grows greater and the interest of the sporting world increases.
