Spring lambs sold for \$6 to \$7.50 per cwt. There are widely different prices quoted on hogs by the different buyers but at any rate the market is keener and prices are somewhat firmer. Avinston, 15th July, 1911.  
 Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present.  
 Minutes of previous meeting read, and on motion of Mr. Munro, seconded by Mr. Tait, were approved.  
 Mr. Gibson, local member of the Bell Telephone Co. and Mr. Carrothers, Secretary of the Advisory Board of the Brooke Municipal Telephone System, were present, and an attempt was made to reduce to writing an agreement, by which the Avinston and Watford branches of the Bell Co. would act as the central offices of the Brooke System. Some progress was made and the Reeve was to call a special meeting of Council, if deemed necessary, when the Bell Co. had agreement ready.  
 Thomas Higgins complained that the ditch on south side of Townline road, Brooke and Warwick, opposite lot 11 was out of repair.  
 Darvill—Fisher, that the matter be referred to Councillor Sutton.—Carried.  
 J. F. Elliott, Watford, asked for reasonable compensation for injuries to his horse, caused by breaking through the bridge on 15-16 sideroad, con. 12, Brooke, on 24th May last.  
 Fisher—Monro, that Mr. Elliott be paid the sum of \$25.00 in full of all claims.—Carried.  
 Claim made by Messrs. Cowan & Tow-

ers, Sarnia, on behalf of Mr. Henry Stewart and wife, Watford, that they were injured by being thrown out of their buggy on 3-4 sideroad, the horse having shied at roller and road being narrow.  
 Darvill—Monro, that claim be referred to Township Solicitor.—Carried.  
 Award read, re equalization of rates in Union School Section No. 7, Brooke, and No. 11, Epphemia. Costs \$18, payable by Brooke, \$12.  
 Monro—Tait, that award be accepted and order issued in favor of Inspector in payment of costs.—Carried.  
 Monro—Sutton, that by-law No. 11, to authorize repairs to the Lucas Bros. Drain, be read a third time and finally passed.—Carried.

 Darvill—Fisher, that the sum of \$1000 be placed to the credit of the treasurer of the Advisory Board of the Telephone System; and that the Clerk prepare a by-law for submission at next meeting, to borrow by corporation note the sum of \$6000, or a less sum if suitable.—Carried.

Committee appointed to make enquiries re the advisability of the erection of a joint Town Hall in the Village of Avinston, reported favorably, and asked leave to further continue their enquiries.—Granted.  
 Fisher—Sutton, that the tender of Angus Stewart at \$5.25 be accepted for the work and material required on the 7-8 con. Blind Line, provided the drain was gone on with.—Carried.  
 Sutton—Monro, that Council do now adjourn to meet in the Village of Inwood on Saturday, the 12th day of August, 1911.—Carried.
