WINTER COURSE IN AGRICULTURE

(Continued from Page One.)

afforded by the Agricultural Short Course held at Lawrencetown, and, WHEREAS, it is the opinion of this Association that a longer course of intensive training would constitute a progressive step in the policy of the Department, and,

WHEREAS, the time is now opportune for the taking of such a step.

WHEREAS, this Association on their part, provided such a course were adopted, would engage to provide for the necessary heating and lighting of the building and would guarantee the continuous attendance of the minimum of twenty-five students throughout the entire course.

THEREFORE RESOLVED, that we, the Annapolis County Farmers' Association request the Provincial Government to provide a four weeks course in Agriculture at the Demonstration Building at Lawrencetown during the month of March, 1924, offering instruction in the following subjects and such others as may be deemed advisable by the Secretary for Agriculture, namely:—live stock, dairying, feeds and feeding, poultry, animal, and plant diseases, fertilizers, fruit growing, sprays and spraying, elementary farm book-keeping and arithmetic, elementary rural economy, civics, marketing, beautifying of home premises, English, debating, etc., and that in addition special lectures be given on subjects of public interest, and also that instruction of a suitable character be given farmers' daughters, and,

WHEREAS, the cutting off or reduction of the funds made available through this grant would be disastrous to the work, and would bring to an end the forward and progressive policy of the agricultural education inaugurated and maintained by its aid and would work a serious injury to the development of an improved rural life in this country.

THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the Annapolis County Farmers' Association assembled in special session, do
