days ago to the Minister of Agriculture recorded at page 8447 of *Hansard* and entitled "Saskatchewan—Preservation of Indian Shrine". As I think the minister knows, the matter involves the possible flooding of an Indian shrine by the rising waters behind the South Saskatchewan river dam. What steps is the Indian affairs branch or the historic sites and monuments board taking or being asked to take to ensure that this ancient Indian shrine will in fact not be destroyed by the rising waters behind the South Saskatchewan dam?

Hon. Arthur Laing (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): Mr. Speaker, we have had some rather frightening estimates about the weight of this stone varying from 200 tons to 450 tons, with cost varying up to \$150,000 and so on. I think the Minister of Agriculture has been speaking to some of his people in P.F.R.A., and there has been a suggestion that at least a modest part of the stone be removed. I have no knowledge whether a subdivision of the stone would be satisfactory to the people who are interested in its transfer.

Mr. Barnett: Has the government been in touch—

Right Hon. J. G. Diefenbaker (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, I made that suggestion months ago and I hope it will be followed.

Mr. Speaker: Order.

Mr. Barnett: I am sorry, Mr. Speaker. The question I was going to ask was whether the government has been in touch with any of the authorities who have become expert in the techniques of moving such stones to higher ground.

Mr. Speaker: Order. I understand that the Leader of the Opposition has a supplementary question.

Mr. Diefenbaker: Mr. Speaker, is it not possible to take a portion of that stone and set it aside? It is regarded as something sacred to the Indians, and with a government that has spent so much on so many things surely this shrine should be preserved in part. Does the minister not agree?

Mr. Laing: Mr. Speaker, I must say that an Indian friend of mine not so long ago said there had been so much talk about the stone in the house that he was surprised it had not moved itself.
