member for Saint-Denis (Mr. Prud'homme) and the Secretary of State (Mr. Faulkner), this bill created a small problem which is, I think, a minor one, but which can very well be settled in the Committee on Broadcasting, Films and Assistance to the Arts. I believe this bill must be referred for consideration at the same time as Bill C-20 which, I think, will be studied soon.

This short debate allowed us, however, to hear some very interesting points. The hon. member of the Progressive Conservative party raised one that is worthy of much attention, because it is very important. So is the point raised by the hon. member for Winnipeg North Centre (Mr. Knowles). He put on the record two bills which are, in my opinion, also very important, and I think, even if he did not request it formally, that we could send these other two bills, together with Bill C-209, to the Committee on Broadcasting, Films and Assistance to the Arts.

In any case, this is my opinion, and I think this should be done immediately.

Mr. T. Lefebvre (Pontiac): Mr. Speaker, with all due respect to the hon. member for Winnipeg North Centre (Mr. Knowles), he and I have already had a private conversation on this very subject about his own bills C-260 and C-317. Mr. Lambert (Edmonton West): You do have authority. Why else would there be a chief whip?

The Acting Speaker (Mr. Penner): Is the House ready for the question.

Motion agreed to, bill read the second time and referred to the Standing Committee on Broadcasting, Films and Assistance to the Arts.
