THE SENATE OF CANADA

BILL T⁹.

An Act for the relief of Mary Flatman Tardif.

Preamble.

WHEREAS Mary Flatman Tardif, residing at the city of Quebec, in the province of Quebec, wife of Joseph Adelard Tardif, who is domiciled in Canada and residing at the city of Montreal, in the said province, has by her petition alleged that they were married on the twenty- 5 second day of May, A.D. 1944, at Ferryhill Station, in the county of Durham, England, she then being Mary Flatman, a spinster; and whereas by her petition she has prayed that, because of his adultery since then, their marriage be dissolved; and whereas the said marriage and adultery have 10 been proved by evidence adduced and it is expedient that the prayer of her petition be granted: Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

Marriage dissolved. 1. The said marriage between Mary Flatman and Joseph 15 Adelard Tardif, her husband, is hereby dissolved, and shall be henceforth null and void to all intents and purposes whatsoever.

Right to marry again. 2. The said Mary Flatman may at any time hereafter marry any man whom she might lawfully marry if the said 20 marriage with the said Joseph Adelard Tardif had not been solemnized.
