An emissary from Ottawa well posted in contemporary sports came to the city yesterday, thinking the new arena was nearing completion, to arrange an exhibition game on behalf of the Ottawa Hockey Club, which he will gear around next Christmas.

Lacrosse is not a live topic at the Capital. There is little interest in the national game and baseball will likely supplant it as far as public favor goes the coming summer. They look on complacently at the battle between the coast league and the Big Four, having no interest in either and little more in the N.L.U. The Capitals lost money last year and the men behind are willing to sit tight and see the other fellows mix it up in 1912.

In Ottawa they believe Montreal has the worst outlook on the map. They are up against it two ways, with an even break between the N.L.U. and Big Four clubs, and then another enemy on the horizon in the British Columbia League.

In the east they look on Toronto's position as fortunate, no opposition from the old establishment and the two local clubs well established on their own fields with barrels of coin to keep up a protracted controversy as long as Con. James desires the warfare.

Members of the Canadian Olympic team and the committee men who go to Stockholm, Sweden, next summer, will have to pay only half-price on the railway to the road lines. Moncton No Match For Quebec Team
Stanley Cup Holders Romp Away From Maritime Challengers and Win by 8 to 0.

QUEBEC, March 13.—By the score of 8 to 0, Quebec tonight took the second round from the Moncton club, the former score of 5 to 3, the final result shows a balance of 1 to 3 in favor of the N. H. A. team, and about equal the difference in quality of the hockey played in the big league games and those outside the borders. With last year's loss, the weakened team, Quebec to-night was at a disadvantage in the situation, and the Moncton played on a very aggressive game for the first twenty minutes, they were better in the game.
