Chicago, March 24.—(U. S. Bureau of Markets)—Hogs—Receipts, 70,000; market 10c to 15c lower; closed firm; estimated to close at 35.00. Bulk of sales, \$10.50 to \$10.65; heavy weight, \$10.50 to \$10.70; light weight, \$10.50 to \$10.65; light, \$10.50 to \$10.70; hogs, \$10.50 to \$10.80; pigs, \$10.50 to \$10.70.

LIVE STOCK MARKET

With a run of 2233 cattle on the Union Stock Exchange yesterday, there was a fairly good steady market for heavy butcher cattle, butcher cows and bulls. The one exception to the rule was the steers with weight and quality commonly known as the export class, and which sold off a straight 50 cents per cwt from last week's trading. The decline was most marked and in sympathy with the Buffalo, New York and Chicago markets, which were all relatively lower.

There was a good demand for breeding stock and feeders and heavy weight butchers cattle of good quality. The milkers and springers were slow, and probably a little lower except for the better class of cattle. This in turn was the result of the summary of yesterday's market, and while in some quarters it may be regarded as a trifle optimistic, it is a fair reflection of the actual facts. While the market was not altogether cleaned up, it must be regarded as fairly quiet and steady.

There was a light run of sheep and lambs, about 100, and a heavy lot of sheep and lambs to 12c. There was a demand for sheep and lambs except the poorer class of lambs and sheep. There was a fair lot of calves, a little sharp decline from the previous day.
