WHEAT MARKET IS STRONG.

Futures on Saturday Advanced in Chicago and Liverpool.

Big Purchases by shorts, a Better Export Demand and the Possibility of War are the Leading Factors—Corn and Provisions Firm in Sympathy—Gossip.

Saturday Evening, April 2. After a week of comparative weakness the wheat market moved up to-day and became strong on the possibility of war, improved export demand and large covering by shorts.

In Chicago May and July wheat both gained 1/4c for the day, the September and December contracts advancing 1/8c and 5/16c respectively. Liverpool cables were very strong, wheat closing at from 1 1/4c to 1 1/2c over Friday's last bids.

Chicago was strong on Liverpool cables of an advance of from 1/4c to 1/2c. Oats held firm and provisions advanced 1/16c in Chicago.

It is expected that Minneapolis will show an increase of 300,000 bushels, that Chicago stocks will increase over 1,000,000 bushels, and that the decrease in the United States will be about 1,500,000. English country farmers' deliveries of wheat for the past week were 350,000 quarters, at an average price of 35s 3d.

Beacon advanced 6d in Liverpool. Corn—In its character in Liverpool. Total clearances from Atlantic ports to-day (with Newport to heart) were: Wheat and four equal to 254,000 bushels; corn, 371,138 bushels.

The exports of wheat and four for the past week total 3,896,000 bushels, as against 3,896,000 bushels last week, and 2,464,000 bushels the corresponding week of last year.

The exports of corn for the past week were 4,000,000 bushels, as against 4,000,000 bushels last week, and 4,970,000 bushels the corresponding week of last year.

Live stock receipts at Chicago yesterday: Cattle 1100, sheep 9000, hogs 15,000. Exports at New York yesterday: Wheat 85,000 bushels, four 519 bushels, and 13,463 sacks.

Receipts of wheat at Minneapolis and Duluth to-day were 500 cars. The world's wheat shipments for the past week are estimated at about 8,500,000 bushels. Hogs reaching in Chicago from the opening of the season to date 537,000, as compared with 483,000 for the corresponding period of last year.

July wheat puts at Chicago 82c, calls 83c. May corn puts 29c, calls 29 1/2c. Buttermakers are warned against the use of boracic acid, as it is an adulterant and will ruin the product.

Western dispatches say that there is a shortage of wheat in the West. The estimates of increased acreage run from 20 per cent. Kansas to 50 per cent. Nebraska. It is indicated for Kentucky. There are some complaints from the West of a shortage of wheat.

Straw, dressed, supply limited, and prices easier at \$5.00 for light, and \$5.75 for heavy. Potatoes easy, selling at 60c to 65c per bag by the load, and 70c for single bags.

Apples easier, selling at 40c to 43 per bushel. The supply of poultry was limited; prices unchanged. Corn from farmers' baskets, sold at 20c to 24c per lb., the bulk going at about 22c.
