GOOD THING FOR THE MEN.

Beale of Wages Accepted Which
Means an Increase of 25 Per
Cent. for 45,000 Men.

Detroit, Mich., June 10.—The final conference between the representatives of the iron and steel manufacturers and the Iron and Steel Wage Committee of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers was completed this evening. The next result was that the wage scales for iron and steel workers as fixed by the recent convention of the Amalgamated Association are practically all accepted by the manufacturers. This means a general raise of 25 per cent. for some 45,000 men employed in the iron and steel manufacturing industries.


