The bare statement, that bufidings will cost more this year than last, is apt to be misleading. It would Phone Main 1178. be a much fairer proposition to state that the cost of building in Toronto is now reaching the general level of prices that obtain in other parts of the civilized world. Mr. Denison touches on this point when he compares Pitts-burg prices with Toronto, altho the higher rates of the former are partly to be accounted for by the higher wages. It is when comparing cost of buildings in England, where wages are considerably lower, that we see what little cause there is for alarm. In a recent number of an English architectural journal, the approximate cost of son buildings was given, based on a certain rate per cubic foot, which rate would average at least 25 to 30 per cent higher than the same class of work would be rated at in Toronto to-day. The mere fact that work should cost so much more in a country where wages are so much less should prove suffi-ciently convincing to all that there is nothing abnormal in the trend of Torento prices of to-day.
