FATAL COLLEGE SCRAP

A McGill University Student the Victim.

Montreal, Nov. 14.—A painful feeling has been aroused among the thousands of students of McGill University by the death of one of their number, apparently from the effects of a college "scrap," which took place a week ago. The name of the deceased was J. T. Stewart. He came from Atholstan, Que., and was entered to study for the ministry at the Presbyterian College. This included a full arts course at McGill, and it was while in the arts building last Friday that Mr. Stewart engaged in the "scrap," which resulted in his death at the Royal Victoria Hospital yesterday. The immediate cause of death was an internal hemorrhage, principally in the lungs. Mr. Stewart had been previously troubled with this bleeding, and it is therefore to be supposed that his exertions in the "scrap," while they brought on an increase of his trouble, were not altogether responsible for his death. Stewart was sturdy and strong in appearance, and evidently exerted himself considerably during the progress of the melee. On Saturday morning his hemorrhage increased so much that he was obliged to go to the Royal Victoria Hospital. There it was found that he was suffering from hemorrhage in many places. He died about three o'clock yesterday morning.

London "Society"

Delights Itself With the Champion Divorce Suit.

Lord Wolsley Continues to Make Himself Unpopular.

Queen Victoria Probably About to Make a New Will.

Success of the Theosophist Crusade—Visit of the Party to Greece and Egypt.

Special London Cable Letter to The Advertiser.

London, Nov. 14.—The main attraction of the week for "society" was the hearing, in the Divorce Division of the High Court of Justice, before Justice Sir Francis Henry James, Q.C., of the petition for a judicial separation of Mrs. Caroline Muriel Valentia Le Champion, daughter of Capt. Cunliffe, of Shropshire, from her husband, Mr. Loftus Le Champion. The latter is a relative of the well-known sportsman, Sir Claude Champion-de-Crespigny, Bart., whose eldest son, Claude, a lieutenant in the Second Life Guards, was Le Champion's best man. The couple have only been eighteen months married, and both are but a little over 30 years of age. The evidence further lifts the veil from certain features of social life in Great Britain, and reveals the mode of life of some of the so-called "fast set." The wife, it was shown, upon occasions, came down to dinner in red satin "knickerbockers," otherwise "bloomers," and her husband's smoking jacket, and frequently called her better half a fool. The latter, on his side, was most violent upon nearly all occasions, "making scenes" in public places, and calling his wife vile names. The case was terminated yesterday in favor of Mrs. Le Champion.

LORD WOLSELEY UNPOPULAR.
Lord Wolsley, the commander-in-chief of the forces, continues to make himself unpopular. At the Guildhall banquet he referred to the British navy, which, he said, "has not fought a battle in 84 years, while the army has done much." There is also much friction in the Horse Guards (army headquarters), owing to a dispute over the army surgeons between Lord Wolsley and the Marquis of Lansdowne, the Secretary of State for War, and the feeling of discontent in the army is spreading on account of other matters besides the Hussars scandal.

ROYAL NEEDLEWORK.

The Duke and Duchess of York have taken the greatest interest in the London Needlework Guild. The duke has accepted its vice-presidency, and contributed 107 articles, many of which were made by himself, to the annual exhibition, which opened at the Colonial Institute. The Duchess of York contributes 434 garments, many of them being her own handwork. The Duchess of Teck contributes 3,633 articles; Lady Vernon Harcourt sends 2,068 articles; and the Princess of Wales sends shoes and serviceable clothing. All the contributing members aim to find some articles self-manufactured. There is a total of 55,000 articles, which will be distributed next week to the different missions and hospitals in London.

THE QUEEN'S RETURN TO WINDSOR.

Queen Victoria will arrive at Windsor Castle from Balmoral today, accompanied by Princess Beatrice, the children of the latter and the children of the Duke and Duchess of Connaught and Prince and Princess Charles of Denmark will be guests at Windsor Castle during the coming week. It is reported that the Queen is about to make a new will. The one now in existence was made twenty years ago, and has 22 codicils, necessitated by changes in the royal family. It is engrossed on vellum, quarto size, bound as a volume, and is secured by a patent lock.

LORD ESHER'S RETIREMENT.

The statement made by Lord Escher, the master of the rolls, at the Guildhall banquet, that it was his latest appearance there, is supposed to indicate that he intends to retire, and the gossip has been busy over his successor. It is generally believed that Sir Richard Webster, the Attorney-General, will succeed Lord Escher, and that Mr. R. B. Finlay, the Solicitor-General, will be appointed Attorney-General, though it is probable, but for his remarks on Venezuela in his recent speech delivered at York, that Sir Edward Clarke, Q.C., would have attained Sir Richard Webster's place.

THE VAGABOND CLUB.

The members of the new Vagabond Club have recommenced their series of monthly reunions which are held at the Holborn Restaurant. Mr. Geo. Crossin was the guest at the last of these receptions, which occurred on Thursday last.

EX-EMPRESS EUGENIE.

The Empress Eugenie will leave for her winter home at Cape Martin next month. The ex-Empress is now in better health than for several years past. The attack of rheumatism which so seriously affected her right leg has now entirely disappeared, and although still compelled to walk with a stick, she is able to take exercise in the open air for several hours each day. Her tall, graceful figure, her beautiful white hair, and her distinguished features render her conspicuous wherever she goes.

THEOSOPHIC CRUSADES.

The crusade of the world, inaugurated by Mrs. Tingley and her six American disciples, is meeting with remarkable success, according to reports. Nearly all the great cities of Europe have been visited, and in each, it is said, a flourishing theosophical organization has been left behind. There are now, it appears, societies in London, Dublin, Liverpool, Edinburgh, Paris, Amsterdam, Stockholm, Vienna and Athens, besides numerous lesser cities, and in England, Scotland, Ireland, Sweden, Holland, Ger-

many and Greece, there were enough societies to necessitate the formation of national federations. One of the greatest triumphs in Europe, it is added, was scored in Athens, the last place visited. The "Crusaders" arrived there, total strangers to the country, and not one could speak modern Greek. Mrs. Tingley made for the American consulate, where Consul Harten and his wife received the party cordially. The vice-consul, Mr. Nikolaidis, who is a native Greek, at once volunteered to assist in getting up a big public meeting. The largest hall in Athens, with a capacity of 1,000, was engaged. It was packed long before the hour of opening, and fully 500 persons were turned away at the doors. The members of the party spoke in English, and had to have their remarks translated into Greek through an interpreter. "But," says a letter from Athens, "even under these difficulties, they made such an impression that a score of persons followed the party to the hotel and asked questions about theosophy until midnight. The following day an invitation to organize a society was issued, and 106 persons responded. Among the converts were Consul Harten, and Vice-Consul Nikolaidis. Mr. Kavaphis, a graduate of Oxford, and a prominent citizen, was chosen president. The "Crusaders" say that Athens has the most thoroughly American spirit of any city in Europe, and that they were assured that King George would have attended their meeting had he been in the city. They attribute their success in Athens to the practical identity of the teaching of theosophy with the philosophy of Plato and Pythagoras, and also because the word "theosophy" was borrowed from the Greek "theos," meaning divine wisdom."

Before leaving Athens, the advisers further state, Mrs. Tingley visited 500 exiled Armenians camped on the outskirts of the city. She found them in a pitiable state. The Theosophist party raised a fund with which they purchased blankets and underclothing. The "Crusaders" next visited Eleusis, the site of the ancient Eleusinian mysteries, and then left for Egypt. There they visited the Pyramids, which the members of the party claim to believe they well knew thousands of years ago. Claude Falls Wright, a graduate of Harvard, is said to have found the surroundings familiar, as both assert they bore the same relation of man and wife in Egypt years ago. It is also said that the party there met with one of the brothers of adepts of whom Theosophists speak so much.

MACHINES IN PLACE OF LABOR.

The Daily Mail is publishing a series of articles pointing out the serious effects of the competition of American-made bicycles with the English trade in the popular "wheels." Most of the English firms are expressing what the Mail terms "silly indifference at the situation," apparently considering American "bikes" to be beneath contempt. There may be an awakening among the English manufacturers, however, for today J. K. Starley, one of the foremost men in the cycle trade, and the inventor of a well-known type of "safety," in an interview is quoted as follows: "In domestic machinery America is immeasurably ahead of us. All the best English makers are now buying American machinery. Our English tool makers and machinists ought to be ashamed of themselves. While we have been vainly trying to get additional labor to meet the enormous demand, the Americans have been making machinery."

THE NEW BISHOP OF ALGOMA.

Montreal, Que., Nov. 14.—Canon Thornloe, of Sherbrooke, announces his acceptance of the Bishopric of Algoma. Canon Thornloe is a High Churchman of moderate views. The salary of the new bishop will be \$3,000 a year for ten years.
