

HAMILTON QUIET; MAHON ON HAND

**Head of the Union to Confer
With the Aldermen.**

NO CARS OPERATED LAST NIGHT

**Commandant of Militia Serves Out Ball
Cartridges and Again Warns
the Public.**

Hamilton, Nov. 27. — President Mahon, of the International Street Railwaymen's Union, arrived here today, and at once went into conference with the strikers.
