#### RATIO NOT INCREASING

Dr. Carlos MacDonald, Alienist, Discusses Insanity.

London, Sept. 16 .- Dr. Carlo F. Mac-Donald, the alienist, talked today with correspondent in regard to recent statistics of the insane issued by the lunacy commissioners of England and Wales. Dr. MacDonald said:
