ALLIES CAN DEPEND

ON HELP OF CHINESE

SAYS CONSUL-GENERAL

Unlimited Man Power Available at Any Time.

A banquet in honor of the Chinese consul-general for Canada, Yang Shu Wen, was given at the Grand Cafe last evening by the proprietor, Charles Chou.

City and county officials and prominent citizens attended.

The consul-general has been in the city for some days in the interests of his countrymen, and the opportunity was taken by Mr. Chou to have him meet representative citizens.

Yang Shu Wen, in a brilliant address, outlined the history of his country and the character of his fellow countrymen. China, he said, although unable to assist the Allies in any marked way financially could be depended upon to furnish man-power unlimited if called upon to do so by the Allied nations.

Crown Attorney McKillop, Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon, J. M. McEwen, Samuel Stevely and others spoke in a complimentary way of the Chinese residents of London. They were all law-abiding citizens and deserving of the greatest consideration, the speakers said.

LABOR MEN OBJECT

TO RESOLUTION OF

THE BOARD OF TRADE

Discuss Farm Labor and Greater Production.

A resolution of condolence to Mayor C. R. and Mrs. Somerville was passed by standing vote at the regular meeting of the trades and labor council meeting last evening.

A communication was read from Mrs. Varley, wife of Sgt. Varley, of Toronto, thanking the council for its interest on behalf of her husband. She also thanked them for the donation of \$50 which was sent her.

A communication from R. M. McElihan, secretary of the board of education, stated that there was no vacancy in the industrial advisory committee. If there were a vacancy the board of education in compliance with the act governing such matters would make the appointment.

Says Camouflage.

There was some discussion over this communication. One delegate called it camouflage. The committee was appointed to procure a copy of the act governing the appointment of representatives to the industrial advisory committee of the board of education.

H. J. Halford, chairman of the Ontario executive committee of the Trades and Labor Council, asked for representatives to be sent to a meeting to be held in Toronto on Good Friday to form a political labor party. The meeting did not accept the terms of representation that was offered the different labor bodies by the proposed labor party. On motion the communication was filed.

In connection with the discussion of this motion, Ald. H. B. Ashplant of the I. L. P., who was not present, came in for considerable criticism by the delegates. The farmers also received much criticism for their attitude toward organized labor.

Want Some Action.

A copy of a resolution discussed by the board of trade, called for some action by the Government to secure the necessary labor for the farms, either by conscription of labor or by making up to the volunteer the difference in wages if he left his city position to go to the farm. Strong objections were taken to this resolution.

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
