New Ruling in Regard to Taxation Is Expected.

In all probability the assessors will not start on their rounds until March I this year, says Assessment Commissioner Stephen Grant. Last year they were out by the middle of February. Mr. Grant says that they will wait until March on account of the expected change in the assessment act.

One of the changes he expects is that respecting the taxing of incomes from industrial sources, which are now exempt. Thus, if a man has an investment in a manufacturing or mercantile establishment his income of rived from that investment is at present exempt from taxation. However, if his investment is in any gas or electric or telephone company, or any company that has rights on public high ways, the income from it is taxed. He expects that a change will be made in the act to allow all incomes from he investment of money in any industries to be legad.

Mr. Grant also expects that there will be a change in the personal income assessment that will exempt the anomal of a householder up to \$2,000 and of a sermon on February 5.

> GOVERNMENT LIKELY TO CONTROL OPERATIONS OF HARBOR CRAFT

Washington, D. C., Jan. 9.—Secretary Daniels and Secretary Baker of the navy and war departments respectively, today, called into conference representatives of the railroad administration and shipping board to consider the New York harbor strike situation. Reports were current before the conference, called for noon, that either the navy or the war department would take over operation of all harbor facilities.

Was labor board officials said the board had exhausted its powers in efforts to adjust the difficulties between harbor workers and their employers and could do nothing but let the strike take its course until a favorable situation developed.

Buenos Ayres, Jan. 2.—All trans-Atlantic shipping has been suspended until the harbor strike is ended, it was announced after a meeting of shipping agents here tonight. The Government was attempting to assist in loading and unloading vessels by using a few Government tugs, but the agents decided that no attempt will be made to move vessels.

It was indicated by some of the agents that their action might tend to shorten the strike.




