TROOPS OFF THE SS. LAPLAND GOT HOME ON SUNDAY

Seventy-One Men and Four Officers Came in Yesterday Noon.

CAPT. CANTIN IN CHARGE

Were All From Rhyll Camp, But Sojourn There Was Short.

Seventy-one men and three officers from the steamer Lapland reached London yesterday on the regular C. P. R. train due at the down-town station at 12:10 p.m. Two cars containing the soldiers were cut out at Quebec street, where the men detained and marched to dispersal station K. The band of the C. P. R. was on hand to welcome them, and to head the parade to Tecumseh Barracks, and a considerable number of relatives and friends of the men met them at the station and went with them to the barracks.

The first man of the party was through the dispersal station within half an hour of the time that he stepped from the train. The remainder were dispersed in 25 minutes, which works out at slightly more than twenty seconds a man. By 1 o'clock the whole party had been dispersed, fed, and started on the way to their homes in the motor trucks provided by the assistant director of supply and transportation.

The men had had nothing to eat since breakfast, and with few exceptions they responded with alacrity to an invitation to adjourn to the barracks, where the Red Cross had provided sandwiches, apple pie and ice cream and cleared the way for the men to meet them at the station and went with them to the barracks.

A large proportion of the men went overseas last year, and saw service in France, and the remainder of the party, which characterized the final weeks of the war. Many of them had been wounded. All the members of the party except the officers were at Rhyll, but most of them only spent about a week there. One exception, a man whose home is in the United States, was at the North Wales camp for three months. The delay was due to the fact that his documents had been mislaid. He said he knew little about the riot, and had learned more of it from newspaper reports than from personal observation.

The voyage of the Lapland was described as a pleasant one, and the men said everything on board was quite satisfactory. They also paid a special tribute of praise and appreciation to the members of the train conducting staff.

More than \$5,000 was deposited in the safe by the men for safe keeping. They were not charged a cent for anything they received.

Free Dental Service For Veterans Is Appreciated
Many Take Advantage of Opportunity To Have Teeth Attended.

A phase of the free treatment of returned soldiers, of which a very great many veterans are taking advantage is that in connection with tooth-treatment. A fact which is not generally known to the public is that every returned soldier is entitled to free dental treatment for a period of two months after his discharge, and that this is appreciated by the number of returned men who return after their discharge to have their teeth attended to by the dentists of the C. A. D. at Carling Heights.

When men go through the dispersal station at Tecumseh Barracks they are interviewed by dentists and provided with certificates entitling them to post-discharge treatment within a period of two months. Six dental officers are on duty each time a party of returned men comes in, three on each side of the room. These officers examine the men's dental condition, which shows not only what treatment they have received in the army, but also the condition of their teeth at the time of their discharge.

From these documents the dentists are able to advise the men what treatment, if any, they should have had, and to ensure their return to civilian life with complete dental health.

On an average about eight discharged men apply to the C. A. D. C. for treatment each day, most of them having been within two months' registration. Their transportation to Carling Heights is paid, and while in the city they receive an allowance to cover their living expenses. This amounts to \$2.25 a day in the case of a private, \$2.50 in the case of a sergeant, \$5 in the case of a lieutenant, and in proportion for other ranks.

G. W. V. A. NOTES
WORKING OVERTIME.
Secretary J. W. Cunliffe is working overtime with the G. W. V. A. local referendum regarding membership qualifications. He has to address about one thousand, three hundred envelopes for mailing the ballot cards.

The question as to who should be eligible to become members of the G. W. V. A. has never been satisfactorily decided. When the question came up for discussion, some holding strong views to open membership and some to restrict membership, but the whole matter was finally left more or less to the discretion of the local branches. The referendum is exceedingly desirable, and it is considered well that a general opinion should be taken from the membership that is growing rapidly, and ought to be well grown.

Committee Recommends Extension of County Roads

Several extensions of roads in the county to connect them with roads of adjoining counties were recommended by the committee appointed at the January session of the county council to review and revise the county road system, which met in the county buildings, Friday afternoon.

It was agreed also to recommend to the council that the roadwork in the county be done on a county basis instead of by individual townships.

In connection with this recommendation, it was recommended that the board of road directors instead of the township committees have charge of the work.

An agreement was reached to ask the council to levy a tax of 15 mills for road purposes.
