PURSE-SNATCHING YOUTH SENTENCED TO REFORMATORY

17th of March Unlucky For Leo Parisella.

MOTHER WEEPS

Goes Down On Her Knees Asking Complainant To Have Mercy On Her Boy.

Leo Parisella, was sentenced to a term not less than three months and not more than two years, less one day, in the Ontario Reformatory by Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon, in police court this morning for snatching and attempting to snatch purses from women on the streets.

On March 17, Parisella, who is apparently about 18 years of age, but who does not know his age, admitted that he and a juvenile had planned the robberles on the afternoon of Wednesday, March 17.

First they went down Waterloo street between King and Dundas street, and spled Mrs. L. Grenville carrying a satchel. Parisella brushed past her but was unable to reach the purse. Then the juvenile repeated the actions of his accomplice with more success. Ho grabbed the purse and tried to wrench it from her. She had a chain connected with it wound about her hand, and although it injured her hand, it was the means of her retaining her valuables. After a short struggle, the juvenile, deeming it unwise to remain on the scene longer, ran away, leaving the complainant in possession of her property. In the satchel was \$51 in cash and some securities. This attempted robbery occurred at 3 o'clock.

Second Attempt. At 3:30 o'clock, Parisella and his pal attacked Mrs. L. Smythe at the corner of Dufferin avenue and Colborne street. They took her purse, which contained 32 and some trinkets, At 4 o'clock, Detective Harry Down was notified of the matter. Within 30 minutes he had arrested the pair and recovered the stolen goods.

Parisella admitted that he had taken Mrs. Smythe's purse. He also admitted having knowledge of the other crime, but said that his friend committed it.

That outside of the portions of the British Empire populated by the white race, the only immigrants allowed should be from the northern and western countries of Europe ("exclusive for the present, at least, of ex-alien enemy countries), where the features and natural characteristics are more simi-lar to our own and trade inhabitants

C. That the medical examination of

C. That the medical examination of immigrants be made more stringent and severe in order to safeguard the health of the community.



That section four of the immigration act, which gives the minister of immigration the power to permit immigrants to enter Canada without being subject to the provisions of the act, be struck out as it encourages favoritism, and is a great source of abuse, and is contrary to the very fundamental principles of democracy.

E. That in all policies of immigration to be adopted, encouragement should be

to be adopted, encouragement should be given to get the best type of immi-grants, such as the practical farmer and experienced mechanic, with particular preference to our comrades in arms in he imperial forces.

F. That the immigration act should

be amended, so as to debar from entry into Canada for 15 years any subjects of those countries with which we were at war during 1914-1919, and that a physical and mental educational test be instituted at the close of this period.

WANT THE PLUMBING **BYLAW RECONSIDERED**

Motion To Be Brought Before City Council Monday. Motion for re-consideration of the

Members of that body were somewhat displeased with the action. They thought they had been as careful with their estimates as was possible with economical management. None of the estimates from other bodies were questioned, but theirs were singled out for reduction, they complained.

They were unanimous in the opinion that a larger expenditure should be made on the city's parks, and accordingly were quite willing to join with the deputation from Waterloo and other cities in asking an increase in the legal rate. plumbing bylaw will be made at the city council meeting next Monday. General dissatisfaction with the measure, which was only adopted late last year, has led to a demand for a re vision.

It is claimed that the bylaw which was intended as a sanitary measure is the legal rate.

If legislation to this effect is passed it will allow an exxpenditure of more than \$40,000 a year on the parks here.
