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BRITAIN TO SEND TROOPS TO RUHR IF TREATY IS AGAIN BROKEN

Lloyd George Would Approve of German Occupation.

UNDER CONDITIONS

British Premier Gives Statement As To His Attitude.

Paris, April 23.—Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain would approve of Anglo-French occupation of the Ruhr district of Germany in the event that the Berlin Government should refuse suitably to live up to the revised terms of the Versailles treaty, says "Perrinax," political editor of the Echo de Paris.

The representative of England, as "Perrinax" in the course of his article, "charged a high military member of his suite with the duty of insinuating questions during discussions for the purpose of giving the impression that if Germany should fail to exactly execute the treaty of Versailles, once it is revised, England would consent to sending her soldiers into the Ruhr Valley in company with those of France."

TREATY NOT LIKELY TO BE REVISED WITHOUT CONSULTING AMERICA

London, April 23.—The London Times today confirms the Paris reports yesterday that Premier Lloyd George and Nitti had urged that a German representative be summoned to San Remo for the purpose of revising the treaty of Versailles, but that the proposed revision was opposed by the French and British governments. To this the newspaper adds: "We understand that any attempt to revise the treaty without consulting the United States will be resented by America, who will be responsible for any complication that may ensue."

PRINCE GHIKIA AT SAN REMO. San Remo, April 23.—Prince Ghikia, Rumanian minister to France, arrived here today from Rumania. He is visiting San Remo for the purpose of following closely Russian questions before the supreme council which meets tomorrow.

G. T. R. BILL IS SENT TO SENATE FOR APPROVAL

Bill Was Under Debate For the Past Two Weeks.

Ottawa, April 23.—The House of Commons at an early hour this morning, gave third reading to the bill covering acquisition of the G. T. R. by the government of Canada. The vote of the third reading showed a government majority of 21.

The measure now goes to the senate for its concurrence.

GERMAN RAILROADERS FORCED GOVERNMENT TO GRANT DEMANDS

Increased Wages Ordered To Prevent General Strike.

Berlin, April 22.—(By the Associated Press).—That the railwaymen's demands for increased wages have taken the shape of a general ultimatum to the government, with an alternative threat of a general strike, was indicated late yesterday when at the close of the sitting of the National Assembly the Socialist Deputy Kottur moved that 2,000,000 marks be immediately appropriated for that purpose.

Dr. Wirth, minister of the treasury, replied that the government was not prepared to accede to the demands, but would ask the house to assent, as he had been informed that certain points owing to the impression among the men that the government was unduly delaying the matter.

CANADIANS INCREASE SAVINGS IN BANKS BY TEN MILLIONS

Ottawa, April 23.—By Canadian Press.—The monthly bank statement for March, issued by the finance department today, shows a small increase in bank note circulation over the previous month, with a rather large increase in deposits in the central gold dollars. Savings deposits increased during the month by approximately ten million dollars. The principal figures are:

QUEBEC DRY MEASURE PROHIBITS BRINGING OF LIQUOR INTO ONT.

Citizens of This Province Cannot Return With Wet Goods.

CAN BE SHIPPED

Ontario Citizen Is Regarded as Resident If On a Visit.

Montreal, April 23.—Ontario people who come to Montreal and buy liquor with a view to taking it back to Ontario under the belief that they are legally entitled to do so are liable to find themselves mistaken, it was learned here today. The provisions of the Quebec prohibition law, and its manner of enforcement, are to the effect that Ontario men visiting this province are regarded as having their residence here, and are treated as such. This means that they cannot take liquor into Ontario and order liquor for this own use and then take it back with them. He may, however, order it to be sent him to a point in Ontario.

The only liquor that can legally be taken into Ontario is that secured by means of a medical prescription, and under 43 ounces.

CAILLAUX IS SENTENCED TO 3-YEAR TERM

Ex-French Premier Was Convicted On Serious Charge.

TIME SERVED DEDUCTED

Former Official Will Have But One Month To Serve.

Paris, April 23.—Sentence of three years' imprisonment was imposed today upon former Premier Joseph Caillaux, convicted by the high court yesterday of the charge of correspondence with the enemy. The time during which he was under arrest will be deducted, however, leaving him but one month to serve.

TAKES CONVICTION CALMLY.

Paris, April 23.—M. Caillaux received the news of his conviction stoically, showing less temper than at any time since the trial began.

Article 78 of the military code, under which M. Caillaux was convicted, dates back to 1808, and was aimed especially at French businessmen guilty of corresponding with British brokers during the blockade, and giving them the stock exchange figures and other information.

M. Caillaux's plan for the future has not been made public, but it is learned on good authority that if he is sentenced to banishment for any length of time he will proceed to South America. When the high court convened for the afternoon session, the verdict was read to Caillaux, informing him that he was guilty of violating article 78 of the military code. He was asked if he had anything to say. Caillaux replied: "No, I have nothing to say."

Maitre de Mante then said for the defence: "M. Caillaux has been found guilty of the crime with which he was accused, and against which he was not defended. I let you take the responsibility, appeal to justice! I appeal to France."

After the reading of the verdict to M. Caillaux the high court, convened in secret session to deliberate on the sentence to be imposed.

PETERBORO LAWYER DIES.

Peterboro, April 23.—The death of K. C., a prominent lawyer of this city, aged 77 years, at the time of his death deceased was chairman of the utilities commission and the Peterboro city trust commission.

WHERE WILL COLLEGIATE PUPILS TAKE UP STUDIES NEXT WEEK?

Technical School Regarded As Temporary Solution to Question—Board of Education To Review Situation—Ways and Means Suggested.

School accommodation for a thousand high school pupils is being sought today by the board of education. The Technical School is regarded as the solution to the problem, and the high school committee and technical committee will make a joint review of the situation there today.

School accommodation generally is so limited that it is expected there will be considerable difficulty in finding classrooms for such a large number of pupils on short notice. Several plans are under consideration, and it is quite possible that high school classes will be opened by the beginning of the week.

Not Affected. The commercial section of the school is not affected. The classes in this division are accommodated in two buildings, one directly behind the main school, and the other, the old Princess avenue public school. All the rooms in this latter building are not occupied. The plan which may be followed is to move the commercial classes from this school to the Technical School, equip the remaining rooms at the Princess avenue school, and accommodate as many collegiate pupils there as possible.

It is practically imperative that all the classes be accommodated in one building, as it is impossible to have one room for instruction in different subjects. At the public schools one teacher remains in charge of a class throughout the entire day.

This condition has suggested another plan to afford temporary accommodation. One of the public schools may be taken over for a collegiate, and the public school classes may be accommodated separately in Sunday school.

SUPREME COUNCIL FORMULATES PLANS ABOUT DARDANELLES

Control To Be Under Two International Boards.

San Remo, April 22.—(Associated Press).—The plans for the control of the Dardanelles were formulated by the supreme council at today's session. The control will be exercised by two international commissions. One of these, an administrative body, will regulate the traffic, fix the dues for the use of the straits and supervise affairs generally, much the same as the Suez Canal commission does for the Suez waterway.

The other body will be a military commission, having at its disposal forces which will be located in part on the Gallipoli Peninsula and in part on the other side of the straits.

COLLEGIATE LOSS, \$200,000; \$60,000 INSURANCE CARRIED

Estimated Cost of Rebuilding Is Half Million Dollars—Trustee A. N. Udy Brought Up Question of Increased Insurance Several Weeks Ago—No Action Was Taken.

Although the loss at the collegiate and the scene the flames had gained a head hold on the chemistry room on the top floor. From there they spread between the rafters and the roof, and soon enveloped the stairway, forcing the firefighters to retreat. Some of them remained on the top floor of the building until the danger of the roof and floor collapsing forced them to relinquish their position. When the flames were turned in it was thought that this had hardly ended, they were able to bring all but a few hundred feet of hose into play.

Pressure to fight the flames in this three-story structure had to be maintained from small-sized domestic mains. The largest was a 10-inch main on Waterloo street. The water was main on Dufferin avenue and a 4-inch main on Princess avenue. Pressure from these was not nearly sufficient to reach the flames which were devouring the top of the building.

The fire engine was brought into play in order to give sufficient pressure to reach the corners, which were blazing fiercely and falling to the ground in huge sections.

Required 395 Shells to Kill One Soldier

Member of French Academy Makes Extended Investigation.

Paris, April 23.—Dr. Mercher, a member of the French Academy of Medicine, after an extended investigation, has determined that during a period of five months in 1917 a total of 3,500,000 shells fell on the front of the three French armies in Asia Minor. Dr. Mercher, killed 13,265 men and wounded 55,412. According to his figures, it took a total of 395 shells to kill one man, and half as many to wound one.

ENTENTE AUTHORITIES ARREST IZZET PASHA

1,200 Adherents of Mustapha Kemal Are Apprehended.

Constantinople, April 23.—(Associated Press).—Izzet Pasha, former grand vizier, was placed under arrest by Entente authorities here Wednesday. General Aliza, Pasha and several other prominent Turks were also apprehended.

Damad Ferid Pasha, grand vizier, has taken charge of the war office because of dissatisfaction there has been with the board of officials who were charged with being responsible for the trouble.

Twelve hundred adherents of Mustapha Kemal are reported to have been arrested, and many are being thrown into jail daily. Officers of one entire section of the war office are reported to have deserted their desks and gone to Anatolia.

All Mohammedans are called upon to unite in a movement to "remove the sultan from Allied participation" in a proclamation issued by Col. Jafar Tavar, commandant at Adrianople on April 15.

U. S. IS REQUESTED TO SEND WARSHIPS TO MEXICAN PORT

Message Says American Lives and Property Endangered.

INVESTIGATE CALL

Appeals of Similar Nature Are Frequently Received.

Washington, April 23.—American Government representatives in Mexico have asked for the dispatch of warships to that country to protect American citizens and their property. The requests came from Mazatlan and Tepic, on the Pacific coast, and Frontera, on the Gulf coast. Officials of the state, war and navy departments are investigating the requests, explaining that in times of disturbances in the southern republic it is not unusual to receive requests for warships when there is no need for them.

KING'S CHAPLAIN MAY SPEAK HERE

At Men's Brotherhood Banquet On May 6.

Chaplain to a king, General Davies, famous in British military and religious circles, is expected to visit London on May 6. He is the spiritual adviser of King George V of England, and is now touring the United States and Canada in behalf of the World's B.B.R. Brotherhood movement.

CONVICTION UNDER O. T. A. IS QUASHED

Evidence Not Produced To Warrant Finding Waiter Guilty.

Toronto, April 23.—That were last night of a certain T. H. and B. train between Hamilton and Buffalo recently. An American customs officer found two bottles of whiskey in a linen locker of the dining car. Eleven bottles were found elsewhere. T. J. Townsend of Buffalo, a waiter in charge of the linen closet was fined \$300 by the magistrate at Bridgeburg for violation of the Ontario temperance act. This morning the case was brought before Justice Logie, and he quashed the conviction on the ground that there was no evidence to show that Townsend had exclusive control of the linen locker.

EXPECTS PRICE OF NEW POTATOES TO BE \$15 PER BARREL

Toronto, April 23.—Although local women are not buying potatoes in such large quantities as formerly, the potato dealers unanimously declared that they have felt no effect as a result of the boycott of the department of justice. The price of new potatoes this season in Toronto would be \$12 to \$15 per barrel.

DRY REFERENDUM TO BE SUBMITTED SOON TO NOVA SCOTIA VOTERS

Halifax, April 23.—The question of absolute prohibition of the importation of alcoholic beverages will be placed before the hands of the electorate of Nova Scotia at yesterday's sitting of the House of Assembly. Hon. Mr. Daniels moved a resolution calling for a plebiscite on the subject. The resolution passed unanimously.

MUSTAPHA KEMAL HEAD OF INDEPENDENT STATE

London, April 23.—Anatolia has formed an independent government, under the presidency of Mustapha Kemal, leader of Turkish nationalist forces in Asia Minor, according to a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company, dated at Constantinople on Wednesday.

GERMAN LIKELY TO ANNOUNCE SHE WILL BE UNABLE TO PAY BUT PART OF HER INDEMNITY

Berlin, April 23.—(By the Associated Press).—Germany will announce before May 10 the amount she is able to pay as part of her indemnity to the Allies. The finance ministry has not yet definitely indicated the sum, but it is hinted that the amount will be below 100,000,000 marks.

Overall Campaign Is Forcing Down High Clothing Prices

New York, April 23.—One of New York's large ready-to-wear clothing houses in advertising today reductions to \$37.50 in the price of a suit, and overcoats, ranging from \$35 and reductions to \$25.00 on those priced as high as \$75, announced the drop as "a deliberate cutting of our own profit for the purpose of helping the movement to force down the high cost of clothing."

DIVORCE BILLS ARE EXPECTED TO PASS; MANY WILL OBJECT

Roman Catholics Will Put Up Strong Opposition.

GOVERNMENT IS IN FAVOR

Senator Lynch Staunton's Measures Likely To Fall in House.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, April 23.—The fate in the Commons of certain measures initiated in the Senate is in doubt. Senator Lynch-Staunton, the father of a measure whose purpose it is to compel on penalty of fine or imprisonment of both, dealers in German or Austrian goods to advertise the fact on the envelopes of their correspondence, and on their stationery. The senator is pressing the bill, which has already been reported from committee and stands for third reading. That it will pass is fully anticipated. Thereafter it must come to the Commons for consideration. While there was considerable discussion on the bill in the Senate and not a few objections, a number of members voted for it on the assumption that it was a temporary measure and could be repealed later when conditions between the countries become normal. It is not believed, however, that the Government will take the responsibility of sanctioning its passage in the Commons, and as a consequence the bill in that House is almost certain to defeat.

FEDERAL AUTHORITIES THREATEN TO ARREST LEADERS OF STRIKE

Warning Is Issued To Cleveland Union Officials.

Cleveland, April 23.—Immediate arrest of railroad strike leaders in Cleveland unless they ordered to return to work by tomorrow morning was threatened by federal agents today.

The warning was given by J. O'Rourke, president of the Cleveland Yardmen's Association, by John Sawchenko of the department of justice before the executive committee of the association met at noon.

FRANCE AND BOLSHIEVIKI ARRANGE FOR EXCHANGE OF PRISONERS OF WAR

Agreement Is Reached After Weeks of Negotiation.

Paris, April 23.—Representatives of France and the Russian soviet government have signed an agreement relative to the exchange and repatriation of prisoners of war held in each country.

GUELPH COMPANY WOUND UP BY JUDGE'S ORDER

Toronto, April 23.—By order of Justice Lacombe, the Motion Picture Company of Guelph was today ordered wound up on the petition of P. H. Sargent of Guelph, a creditor to the extent of \$120. The company was incorporated in 1919, with a nominal capital stock of \$200,000. Its assets are \$25,000, and its liabilities \$15,531 more than the assets.

JURY UNABLE TO AGREE IN COL. PORTER'S TRIAL

New York, April 23.—The jury in the case of General Augustus Drum Porter, former third deputy police commissioner, indicted in New York's vice war on a charge of neglect of duty, reported at 12:05 o'clock today that it had been unable to reach a verdict. It was immediately discharged by Judge Malone.

The jury was out nearly 21 hours. It was reported that members stood nine to three for acquittal from the taking of the first ballot until they reported to the court.

Judge Malone later sent for Assistant District Attorney Smith and directed him to place Col. Porter on trial again next week. Contradicting defence counsel, Mr. Smith declared that instead of standing 9 to 3 for acquittal, the jury voted 11 to 1 for conviction on 14 of 15 ballots cast.

SCHOONER IS WRECKED

St. John, N. B., April 23.—Word received here is that the three-masted schooner Samuel Castner, Jun., Capt. Thomas W. Clark, which left St. John last Saturday for New York, with 232,606 feet of spruce board, had struck on Swan's Island, Maine, and is a total loss.
