STRATTON.
 The Hon. James Robert Stratton, provincial secretary of the Province of Ontario, since Oct. 21, 1899, was born at Millbrook, Ont., on May 3, 1859, and was educated at Peterboro, in 1878 he began the publication of the Weekly Examiner, which became The Daily Examiner in 1885. After serving for several years on the board of education he was returned to the provincial legislature in the Liberal interest at the general election of 1892. During this period he served as chairman of the legislature in committee of the whole, and as chairman of the printing committee. In addition to his public office he is president of the Dominion Permanent Loan Co. of Toronto; president of the Trusts and Guarantee Co. of Toronto, and president of the Peterboro Lock Manufacturing Co. Mr. Stratton is a member of the Methodist Church, and married in August, 1881, the eldest daughter of I. R. Cromwell. He was a notable figure in the Stratton-Gamey scandal of two years ago.

GIBSON.
 Lieut.-Col. the Hon. John Morrison Gibson, B.A., LL.B., K.C., is a native of Toronto, where he was born on Jan. 3, 1842. Educated at the Central School, Hamilton, and at University College, Toronto, he graduated in 1863, winning several prizes. He was called to the bar in 1867, and took his law degree at Toronto University in 1869, when he won the gold medal. In 1870 he was appointed Q.C. by the Ontario government. Mr. Gibson was for many years an enthusiastic volunteer, commanding the 11th Battalion for several years, of which he is now honorary lieutenant-colonel. In 1879 he won the Prince of Wales prize at Wimbledon, and in 1880 he was commended the team that defeated the British team for the Kolarup Cup. He has also been a prominent Mason, acting as grand master of Canada from July, 1892, to July, 1894. He was first

UROHART'S BREEZY MEETING ENDED BY CHEERING BOULDER

Mayor Defends His Public Ownership Attitude But Isn't Solid on Railway Matters.

The meeting held last night in McBeau's Hall, corner of College and Bloor streets, was the last of the series of public meetings on the subject of the proposed railway. Mayor Urohart, who presided, defended his public ownership attitude, but was not so solid on railway matters.

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GRAHAM.
 George P. Graham, member for Brockville in the legislative assembly, was born at Engenville, Renfrew County, Ont., in March 21, 1859, and was educated at the high school in Brockville and at the University of Toronto. He was formerly manager of The Morning Herald and associate editor of The Ottawa Free Press. He was first elected to the legislature at the general election of 1898, and was re-elected in 1902.

MACKAY.
 Alexander Grant Mackay, M.A., K.C., was born on March 7, 1860, in Sydney, Nova Scotia. He was educated at Owen Sound Collegiate Institute, and Toronto University. He was county crown attorney for Grey County from 1894 till 1901, and high school principal for four years. At the general election of 1902 he was returned to the legislature. Mr. Mackay is a Presbyterian.

EVANTUREL.
 The Hon. Francois Eugene Alfred Evanturel, eldest son of the late Hon. F. Evanturel, minister of agriculture in the Macdonald-Sikotte administration of Canada in 1882, was born in Quebec City on Aug. 31, 1848. He graduated at the Quebec Seminary, he graduated LL.B. at Laval University in 1869, and was called to the bar in 1871. For some time he acted as editor of L'Interprete newspaper, and was one of the first persons of French-Canadian birth elected to the legislature in 1882. He accompanied the cabinet to the interprovincial conference at Quebec in 1887, acting as hon. secretary. At the meeting of the new legislature, on Feb. 10, 1887, he was unanimously elected speaker, and in the same session he was elected speaker of the ninth parliament on Aug. 3, 1888. In April, 1900, he acted as an honorary secretary for Canada at the Paris International Exhibition.

QUIET ON WESTERN FRONT.
 Isolated Artillery Fire Followed by Complete Silence.

With the Russian position at the village of Huanian, 10 miles south of Mukden, via Mukden, Oct. 20, 24.5 p.m.—All has been quiet to date on the western front. There were isolated charges of artillery in the early hours of the day, but later complete silence prevailed.

SPECIAL AUDIT MADE.
 Winnipeg, Oct. 20.—The special audit of the books in which Melvin Bartlett, late clerk in the provincial agricultural department, kept the accounts, connected with the sale of marriage licenses, has been completed. The result will not be made public until the ministers, who are just now busy with the Dominion politics, have considered, appointing a commission of two judges to deal with Bartlett's charges against the Hon. J. G. McCreary, minister of agriculture, and it is expected that the judges will be at once named and instructed to proceed with the matter with as little delay as possible.

Blame to Housley.
 Winnipeg, Oct. 20.—The medical commissioners appointed by the city to report on the cause of the prevalence of typhoid in the city have completed their work, and in their opinion the existence of fever can be laid almost wholly to the unsanitary conditions prevailing in the city. This, coupled with the cause of carrying the disease to different sections, is held responsible.

Interest in New Republic.
 Washington, Oct. 20.—American opinion will be retained on the Lithium of Panama for the present, prepared to meet any emergency which may arise as the result of disgruntled elements in the new republic. This decision was reached after orders have been issued for a new battalion of marines to go to the Lithium about Nov. 15.

Peace Society for Gaelic.
 The peace meeting in extension of the Boston Congress, held in Gaelic on Wednesday evening, was a great success, 500 people attending in St. Andrew's Church, 100 in the hall. The Rev. Dr. Evans, D.D., of England and Prof. McCarty of Ontario gave addresses along the same lines followed in Toronto. The proceeds for the formation of a branch in Gaelic are bright.

St. Robert Decorated.
 Pekin, Oct. 20.—St. Robert, Inspector-General of Chinese Industries, has been decorated by the Emperor of Japan with the Order of the Rising Sun, in recognition of his services in connection with the commercial treaty, concluded between Japan and China.

MURDERER AT 78.
 Gershman Rapt Suspected of Several Killings Found Guilty.

New London, Conn., Oct. 20.—Gershman, the aged Colchester farmer, who has been on trial for several days, charged with the killing of David Rodoli, a farm hand in his employ, last spring, today was found guilty of murder in the first degree. The prisoner showed no concern when the jury was out four hours, during which time all the evidence was reviewed, and the vote for the extreme penalty was unanimous. He was sentenced to hang by death tomorrow. This is the first time in 60 years that the death sentence has been passed in this county, and the first time it ever has been pronounced on a Hebrew.
