MEN OF THE SEA ARE GIVING GENEROUSLY

In addition to the special war fund which has been raised by the Imperial Merchant Service Guild, and to which they invite contributions from their members and others, large amounts have been contributed by the captains and officers of merchant vessels to the Prince of Wales' Relief Fund. The guild itself has contributed and has now received information from the secretary of the Guild of Captains and Officers who are serving in British ships on the coast of China to the effect that, though by reason of the empire's commerce they have been unable to leave their vessels and go to the front, they have, nevertheless, responded generously to the general appeal for funds which is now being made. Through the London guild they have already contributed more than \$5,000 to

the Prince of Wales' Fund and they are subscribing a monthly percentage of their salaries, from 8 to 5 per cent. In this way \$200 a month is being subscribed as from December last.

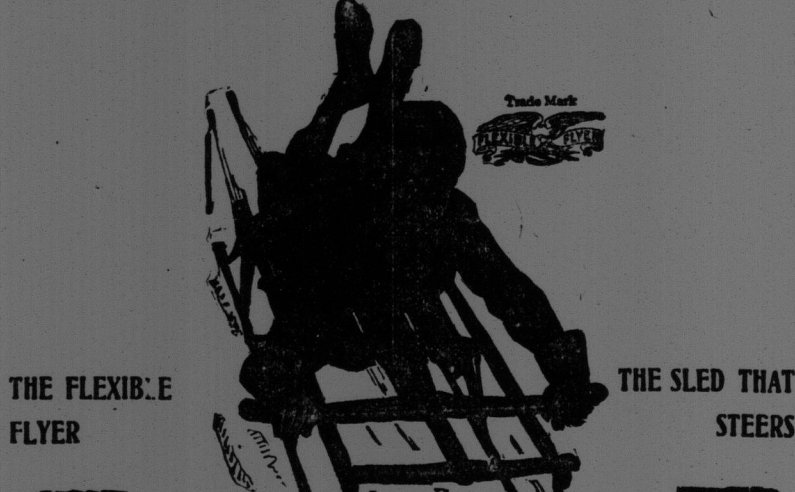

NO VOTES AS YET FOR THE LADIES

Synod Approves Principal But Postpones Action

1915 SESSION CLOSING

Motion to Fix Meeting For Either January or Easter — Vote of Thanks — Committees Organized

The diocesan synod of Fredericton for 1915 closed yesterday morning, according to general opinion among the clergy, a much more successful session than they had anticipated for the year. Beyond a doubt the most interesting feature to non-church members was the outworking of a proposal to grant women the right to vote for the election of delegates to the synod because it did not go far enough. Without legislation to alter the church act, however, no other extension of the power of women as voters in church affairs was possible and the curious result was that a motion that probably a majority favored was rejected.

The matter was brought up on a notice of motion by the Ven. Archdeacon Raymond, already published, to modify the canons so that women be given the opportunity to vote in the election of delegates to the synod. He said that he purposely confined his notice to that point because to get the powers to allow women to vote at vestries or to be vestry representatives would need the alteration of the church act. The synod might, however, give expression to an opinion that might lead to that change.

Rev. H. A. Cody, St. John, seconded. The work of women in the church was one of great and growing influence. It would be not only an act of justice but a recognition of that good work if they were given the power to vote for the election of delegates in the diocese. They had that power and more in some of the Canadian dioceses. In Calgary, Caledonia, Nova Scotia and New Westminster they had the power of voting in the vestries.

In answer to a question the bishop said that the proposal did not go so far as to give women the power to vote at vestries. He thought that the motion was to be regarded as the first of a series of steps which would lead to far-reaching issues. It was a matter that he recommended to the careful consideration of them all before the vote was taken. J. White, Lieut.-Col. E. T. Sturges and Rev. A. S. Hazel spoke.

Archdeacon Forsyth declared that there was in the proposal the spirit of the "thin edge of the wedge." He said it was merely a question of time that could be done without additional legislative powers. It did not concern itself at all with the question of vestries.

A vote was then taken by orders and the clergy voted as follows: For the motion, nine; against, twenty-two. The members voted: For, nine; against, sixteen. There was thus a total vote of: For the motion, eighteen; against, thirty-eight.

In declaring the motion lost, the bishop said that he thought the synod was guided by the fact that the synod wanted the matter of women's vote gone into fully.

Rev. W. Smith, Gagetown, moved that a special evening during the synod be set apart for missionary work, and after a good deal of discussion it was agreed to leave this in the hands of the bishop, the expression of opinion being that such a meeting if possible was desirable.

A notice of motion was given for consideration at the ladies of the North End Red Cross Society served tea to about 200 persons. The function was held in the Temple hall, which was handsomely decorated and lighted for the occasion. Many hands contributed to the work.

They were re-elected for the next meeting to be held in Vancouver. In a question of the date of that meeting the bishop said it was quite impossible to say what would be done as some of the bishops, including the Bishop of Montreal, were opposed to holding the general synod in western Canada.

A notice of motion to change the statistical forms of the Sunday school census was given.

Archdeacon Forsyth moved that the thanks of the synod be given to those in St. John who had entertained the delegates so splendidly and this was carried. Thanks were also passed for the use of Trinity church school room, to the press of St. John for "excellent reports" and to the railroad companies for the facilities granted to delegates were passed.

Archdeacon Forsyth moved and Dr. Campbell seconded a vote of thanks to the bishop for presiding "with wonderful capacity" at these meetings.

God save the King was then sung and the synod of 1915 closed with the benediction pronounced by the bishop.

In the evening a meeting of the executive was held at which the bishop presided and the only business of public interest was the appointment of committees. The following were the committees elected:
