

Speculation Rife As To Who Will Be Chosen Most Valuable National Player

Baseball writers, who have been delegated to name the winner of the National League's \$1,000 prize for the most valuable player will have almost as much of a job as the Democrats had in selecting a presidential nominee at the last convention. There, of course, is a candidate on each team, because there must be one or two players on every one of the eight clubs who are more valuable to the team than their team-mates. To pick the outstanding player, the one who was more valuable to his team than any other candidate was to his team, is a thankless task, almost as hopeless as picking an All-American team that would cause the house to stand in a vote of acclamation. Pittsburgh players, because of the conspicuous places they occupied as National League pennant winners and world's champions, attracted more attention than the players on other clubs and their deeds are of more lasting fame. Pittsburgh fans cannot see how any juror, in his sane mind, can avoid knowing that Kiki Cuyler, the brilliant young Pirate outfielder, is the best and most valuable player in the league. Others who have a sentimental regard for young Cuyler, argue just as vehemently that Max Carey, the star centerfielder and captain of the team, had the most to do with the double victory scored by the club. There are some, too, who think that Pie Traynor and Glenn Wright contributed most of the success of the team. It will have to be left to imagination or the drawing of straws to decide if the Pirates could have reached the top of the baseball world if Cuyler was not in centerfield, or if Carey was not in centerfield, or if there was some other less capable players on the left side of the infield than Traynor or Wright.

RADIO BROADCAST OUTFIT TO U. N. B.

Frank P. Vaughan Makes Gift and Initial Use is Marked Success

Frank P. Vaughan of the Vaughan Electric Company, this city, returned today from Fredericton where he had been installing a radio broadcasting equipment made by himself and which he has presented to the university for scientific research purposes.

After the installation Chancellor Jones made a congratulatory speech as did also Prof. A. F. Baird of the Chair of Physics and Electrical Engineering.

Some broadcasting tests were made and while the equipment has a normal range of from 75 to 100 miles Mr. Vaughan has had return messages from as far distant as Michigan, 1,000 miles. Last night the Fredericton and York county radio fans were delighted with the local broadcast in speeches, gramophone music, etc. Vaughan's private license number—9-B-1—was used.

There will be a formal acceptance and acknowledgement of the gift later.

Dave Bancroft, the manager of the Boston Braves, is also a candidate for the prize as he not only did well with an ordinary ball club but played the best game of his career.

Fredericton Tax Commission Favors Increased Exemption

FREDERICTON, Nov. 12.—Increased exemptions on incomes to be taxed, provision that all taxpayers must file returns of their incomes and taxable property, both real and personal, somewhat along the line as done for the federal income taxation purposes, and changes which will make intangible personal estate taxable upon income earned rather than the capital valuation, were recommendations contained in the report the Commission on Assessment and Taxation, appointed to frame a new assessment act for the City of Fredericton, as presented to the City Council at a special meeting tonight for reception of the report.

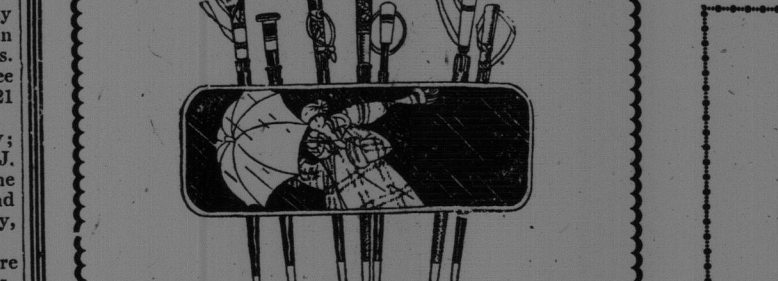

The principle of additional exemptions for married men, widowers and widows with dependent children is realized by the Commission in somewhat the same manner as in connection with federal taxation.

Widows with three dependent children will be exempted up to \$800, which will be the maximum.

Socialists Win Out In French Chamber

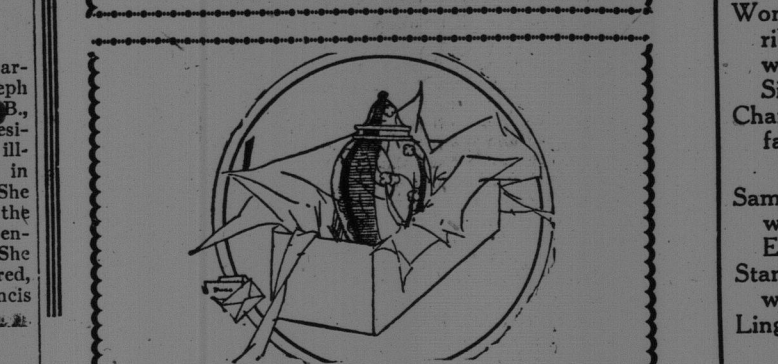

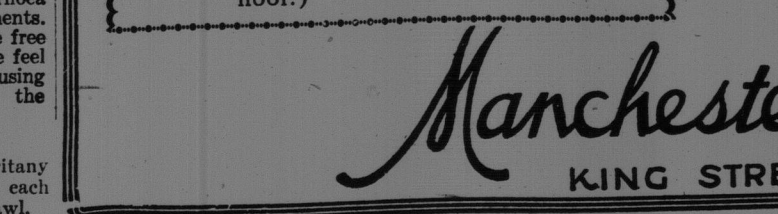
